WOOLMEN HEAR FINE PROGRAM

ATTENDANCE AT BAKER NOT UP TO EXPECTATION.

Excellent Series of Numbers on Top for Woolmen Today.

Baker, Nov. 15.—(Special)—With a good attendance on hand the second day of the Oregon Woolgrowers' convention today heard the following program carried out:

The First Day Important.

Tuesday, the opening day, was important. A brief resume of the first day meeting prepared last evening follows.

The 14th annual convention of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association opened in the court room at the court house this morning with a large delegation from all parts of the state in attendance. Although the attendance was not as large as was expected, the excuse was made that many of the flockmasters were detained at home on account of the unprecedented weather which required their attention in assembling their flocks for the winter.

Mayor Palmer extended to them a hearty welcome, as also did F. A. Harmon on behalf of the Baker Commercial club. Clarence H. Osman on behalf of the association responded to the addresses of welcome in a few appropriate remarks.

The feature of the morning session was the address of George McKnight, president of the association. The address contained about 5,000 words and occupied a considerable portion of

the morning session. It was a clear and concise statement of the conditions confronting the wool growers. Referring to the sheep industry in the state and its bearing on the growth and prosperity of the state President McKnight called attention to a few figures bearing on the subject. According to his statement Oregon stands fifth of all of the states with 2,696,779 sheep or about 6 per cent of the domestic product in the United States, a valuation of \$13,797,892. Sheep are owned on 6,318 farms or 14 per cent of all the farms in the state. While many of these farms represent companies of men and other owners we can consistently approximate the number of sheep owners at about 10,000. The average family is about four, so to multiply this number of owners by four we have 40,000 people who are directly concerned in the investment of sheep.

Carrying these figures further, Mr. McKnight stated that to take care of the sheep in Oregon it required 5,200 laborers, then assuming that one out of six had a family it meant that fully 50,000 of the population of the state was dependent on the sheep industry for a living.

Dan P. Smythe, secretary-treasurer of the association, submitted his report which showed a balance on hand from the last meeting of \$570.46.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with but the secretary read letters from a number of people who had been invited but could not attend the meeting, among them being one from Gov. West, Congressman Hawley and Lafayette and others.

F. A. Elliott, state forester, read an interesting paper on "Sheep Grazing as an Aid to Forest Fire Protection."

The principal talk this afternoon was made by S. W. McClure, secretary of the National Woolgrowers' association who said in part:

"The tariff on wool is now 11 cents in the grease. Wool in the west shrinks 66 2/3 per cent, while the wool which is imported shrinks less than one-half, therefore our protection against imported wool is less than one-half of 11 cents.

"The American people believe that the tariff on wool is a burden on them. But this is a mistake, for there is not a suit of clothes on sale in Oregon today that the wool grower receives as much as \$2.00 for the wool required in making the suit. The average suit of clothes of good quality contains only 10 pounds of wool as it comes from the sheep's back. The average price of wool in Oregon the past year was 14 cents, so it can readily be figured out that the wool growers receives the magnificent sum of \$1.40 for his portion of the raw material used in the manufacture of the suit."

Hoke Smith Gives Up Governorship.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 15.—Hoke Smith retired from the governorship of Georgia today, preparatory to taking up his duties as United States senator, to which office he was elected by the last legislature. Three aspirants are in the race for governor to fill out the unexpired term. The selection will be determined by the democratic primary early in December.

Nebraska Municipal League.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 15.—Mayors and other officials of many of the chief cities of the state are attending the annual convention of the Nebraska Municipal league, which met in Omaha today for a three days' session.
