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COUNCIL HOLDS BUSY SESSION

ROUTINE AFFAIRS GIVEN ATTENTION.

Sidewalk Cleaning Ordinance Undusted and Put in Working Order.

With five councilmen present, the city council met last night and went through matters needing immediate attention and adjourned until next Wednesday evening. Mayor Richardson and Councilmen Orvis and Fleming were absent.

New by-laws drafted and adopted by Rescue Hose company, and referred to the fire and police committee two weeks ago, were satisfactory to the council and are therefore adopted.

Fifteen dollars per month is the salary allowed L. M. Hoyt as sewer inspector.

The monthly report of the City Auditor Manager showing slight errors that have been corrected was read.

Slaughter House a Problem.

Charter provisions which empower the city council to regulate the construction of slaughter houses within a distance of three miles from the city are believed by City Attorney Cochran to be unconstitutional. The attorney asked for more time to prepare a final opinion in answer to a petition signed by 100 or so residents of North La Grande. The petitioners say the council should not allow the Grande Round Meat company to rebuild the burned down quarters on the present location. The city attorney in a cursory investigation does not think it legal for the city to regulate matters outside its territorial limits.

A nice purse of money will soon percolate through city coffers if all applications for renewal of saloon licenses are allowed by the judiciary committee and the council. The present licenses are nearing their end and treasurer's receipt for \$825.00 accompany the following applications for renewals: U. Lottes, Julius Fisher, Herman Roesch, Geo. E. Good, G. A. Lincoln, J. C. Smith, Brown & Greenhall and Chris Wright.

Resolutions changing the boundary of sewer section, subdivision 1 and 3, were passed.

The petition for replacing of boards at the crossing of Third and O was denied. Mr. Hill asked for the return, saying the planks were removed when the sewer trench was dug and have not been replaced.

The ordinance fixing \$25 for each fire insurance company, already acted upon came up in a revised form but plans were found which hid the ordinance back to fire and police committee. No change in the purpose of the ordinance is made, and after the minor changes had been made, it was finally passed. It provides for sufficient time for the agents to get into communication with the companies before the measure becomes effective. The ordinance carries a fine of \$50, minimum, or \$150, maximum, for violations and jail sentences if fines are not so paid. The agents are not liable, however, for the companies' failures to so pay.

There is some trouble between the city and a few property owners on Adams avenue for macadam walk. W. C. Hanson and others have not taken advantage of the Bancroft act and it looks like the council will order steps

taken to force collection at once as the payments have not been made.

Snow Question Is up.

The ordinance now in the books requiring the property owners to clean sidewalks after snowstorms was brought up and the chief of police ordered to enforce it to the letter. The first snowstorm of the year revealed that little or no attention is paid as a rule to this ordinance. The cement sidewalks down town were slushy for days after the storm and fearing the non-attention to the ordinance which prevailed last year would again be a fact, the council indicated that any violation will be punished to the limit of the ordinance.

The Peare question came up again. The situation has now reached a point where Mr. Peare offers the five acres fenced in by the city sewer and sold by Mr. Peare to have been made of no value to him, while so fenced in by the city, for \$1600.00. The question will be finally acted on next week, likely. The city election details were also laid over until the next meeting.
