Elgin Items of Interest.

The Union County Pomona will meet with Blue Mountain grange, east of La Grande, on December 9th. There will be a program in the afternoon, with several addresses.

The city council held a special meeting last Monday night, for the purpose of granting a saloon license to Charles Pearsons, who has purchased the saloon recently conducted by Otto Young.

There is not activity in the wheat market and prices are normal. The mill has purchased 75,000 bushels, paying a slightly higher price than is now offered. It will grind about 100,000 bushels into flour this season.

George H. Flagg, son of the editor of the Recorder, arrived in Elgin last Monday, to make his home here and to be associated with us in the management of the paper. Until recently he has been editor and manager of the Oregon Mts, a paper published at St. Helens, on the Columbia river.

James Melroy has purchased the property of J. H. Smith, including the large frame building at the corner of Main and Spruce streets, the consideration being 40 acres of land adjoining town, valued at \$75 per acre. The building has been leased to Buell, the furniture and second hand store man, and will be occupied by him as a store room for his furniture.

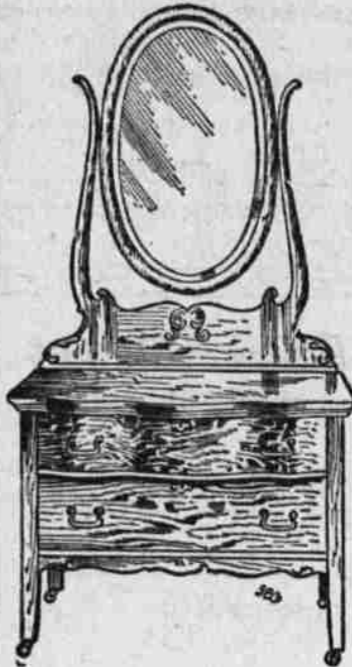
