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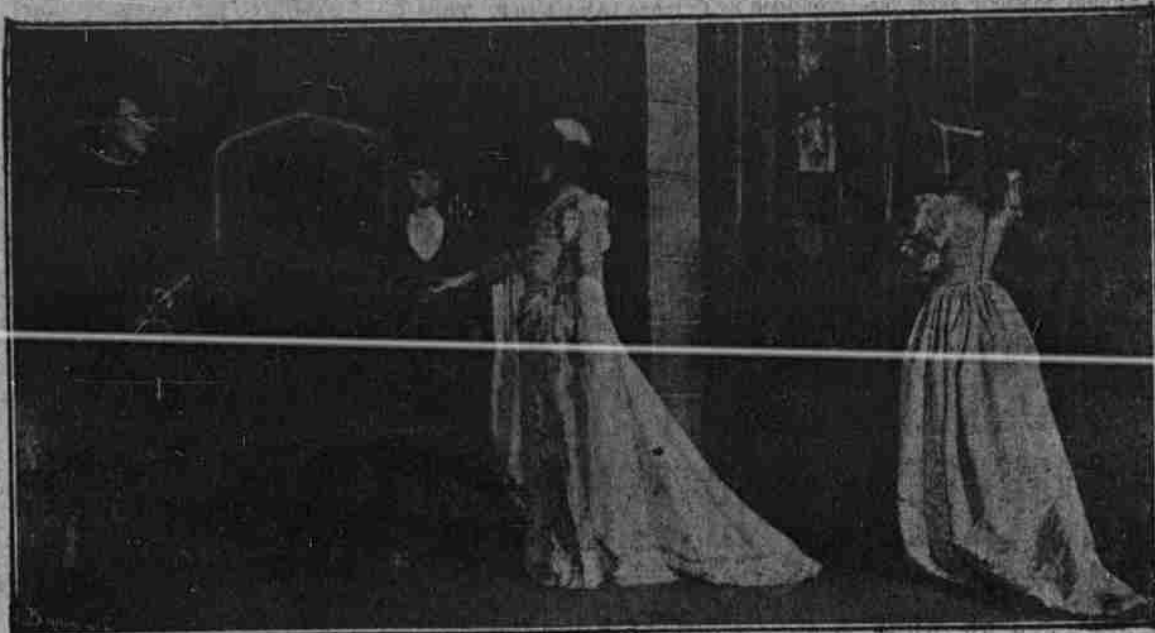
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OLD-FASHIONED COURT DANCES AND XVI CENTURY COSTUMES ADD TONE TO FAMOUS DRAMATIZATION



From beginning to end there have been a few plays in the history of the stage more completely equipped than "When Knighthood Was in Flower." In which play Miss Anna Day and an exceptionally strong supporting company will be seen at the Steward theatre next Wednesday. The costumes have been prepared by the best costumers in New York and are complete in every detail. The old furniture, the tapestry, the armor, the wall scenes, the books, all have been selected because of their special fitness; and one of the hardest things in the rehearsal of the play has been the old fashioned court dances which are introduced in the first act to the rhythm of old fashioned music. In its last act the play is unique, in that the good old atmosphere is retained to the very last, and there is an epilogue spoken by Miss Day, which comes as a sort of personal appeal to the feminine portion of the audience, and which proves to be the climax of the good and lasting impression made by "Mary Tudor" throughout the performance.

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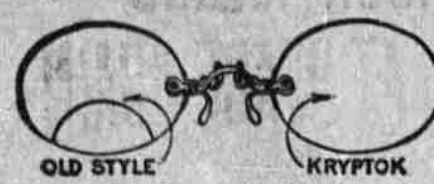
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
