arrived in an automobile from La Grande, they had fled, leaving all their belongings, but taking the girl with them.

Search Is Long and Diligent.

All of Sunday night was spent in the search and much of yesterday was given over to the hunt by the La Grande police. Late last night another clue was unearthed at Summerville. Officer McLachlin directed the search.

Officials Go to Summerville. About 10 o'clock last night Deputy Sheriff Graham and Officer Brady went to Summerville by automobile. Learned that the Wrights had struck out for the summit of the Blue mountains that morning and hiring a team, the officials took the chase.

Found in Camp Near Summit. About 4 o'clock this morning after a hard drive through the snowstorm, the

officials found the Wrights camped near the summit. The girl was taken from the group and returned to La Grande with much attention to her comfort but the father and mother were left there. The girl is now in the hands of tender mothers and she will be taken to Portland at once and replaced in the school.

Yesterday several clues were run down but nothing of importance developed in the whereabouts of the family until last night when the final chase was commenced.

### Undertaking Stupendous.

To those who have autoed up the steep side of the Blue mountains to the summit on the Toll Gate road, the physical task undertaken by the family looms up as stupendous. The fugitives probably got assistance in their trip from Union to Summerville yet it is probable they walked a portion of the way. The little girl is frightened and on her return to La Grande would talk but little. How the little tot, fresh from the comparative ease of her school, was able to trudge along with the feeing parents and cover so great a distance without physical collapse is more than the officials can understand. Officer Brady "turned in" this morning after almost a continuous chase of 48 hours.

### FARMERS AT PENDLETON.

State Organization Meets at Pendleton This Week.
