## TAFT URGES NEUTRALITY

as treasurer, is made by the president as follows:

"Persia has been the scene of a long internal struggle. These conditions have been the cause of uneasiness in European diplomacy, but thus far without direct political concern in the United States."

Pleasure is expressed by the president over conclusion of a new treaty with Japan. He says Admiral Togo's visit "afforded a welcome opportunity to demonstrate the friendly feeling so happily existing between the two countries."

The president says he is convinced that an American merchant marine should be built up speedily, declaring all other great nations pay heavy subsidies, and that this country should not lag behind in this respect.

Feasibility of an international game law is suggested.

President Taft also urges congress to pass laws regulating traffic in opium and other narcotics.

For improvement in the consular service, legislation is asked to incorporate regulations now partially providing civil service. A generous scale of salaries and establishments is also suggested.

Gain in American exports of \$300,000,000 during the fiscal year ended June 30th last also is reported by the president, declaring few arbitrary tariff discriminations exist in this country.

**Russian Treaty Touched.**

By direction of the state department our ambassador to Russia has recently been having serious conferences with the minister of foreign affairs in Russia with a view of securing a clearer understanding of the construction of the treaty of 1832 with modifications of existing Russian regulations which are found to interfere in any way with the full recognition of the rights of American citizens under the treaty. I believe the government of Russia is addressing itself seriously to the need of changing its present practices under the treaty."

## FRUIT GROWERS PLAN EXCHANGE

BY LAWS OF THE UNION ARE PRESENTED.

Each Union to Act Separately on the Provisions Involved.

By-laws as adopted by the committee of 11 men who are framing the working principles of the Central Fruit Marketing exchange embracing unions in all the northwest states have been received by Sherwood Williams of this city. They read as adopted at Spokane a few days ago and will be submitted to the various unions of the northwest for adoption. Each separate local will act on it, many of the big unions including Wenatchee and others having already adopted it. The by-laws suggested for adoption by the local fruit unions follow: the "eleven" meaning the fruit growers and shippers who were named at a meeting a year ago at Walla Walla:

**Report of the Committee of Eleven.**

To the Fruit Growers of the Pacific Northwest:—

Your committee of eleven, appointed at the Walla Walla convention of February 28, 1911, to submit to your local associations a plan there suggested for a central marketing agency, beg to report as follows:

At the call of our chairman we met at Spokane. The chairman, believing that the importance of the movement demanded that the deliberations of the committee should be representative in character, took the liberty to consider the places of absent members as vacant and to substitute other leading fruit growers in sympathy with the movement. For these reasons W. H. Paulhamus and H. C. Atwell were so substituted. Names of the other member will be announced later. L. E. Meacham of Walla Walla was chosen secretary to the committee.

We have been in continuous session since November 23rd, considering the subject of a central marketing agency in the light of reports received on the Walla Walla plan.

Our conclusions are that the principles of the California plan, as reflected in the Walla Walla recommendations, are fundamentally correct, and that they will eventually secure general adherence.

It is our firm conviction that such
