We believe that it is practicable at once to form a statistical bureau which shall exercise the function referred to above, and that such bureau will serve as the nucleus around

We, therefore, recommend that the fruit growers' organizations, within the eleven geographical districts suggested at Walla Walla, take immed! ate steps to establish such statistical bureau, and that during the periods of fruit shipments, the sales managers of said organizations meet at the office of said bureau and co-operate in the sale of the outputs of their respective districts, each said manager retaining absolute control of the output represented by himself.

We also recommend that, during the said periods said sales managers make the office of said bureau their headquarters, transacting the business of their respective organizations at said

The committee make the foregoing suggestions, realizing the necessity or a compromise plan, for the ensuing season; but they believe that a far better plan would be to combine the activities of said sales managers in the hands of one wan, at the outset.

Fundamental Principles,

1. The central exchange should be an organization having no capital stock and distinctly prohibited from engaging in any business for profit.

(Note-the committee recommend that the plan of districting suggested organization should comprise a board at Walla Walla be amended so as to constitute western Washington a separate district; and to combine Malheur county with southern Idaho.)

Any decision announced by the said council of representatives would be final and binding upon the board of trustees, and would be entered upon the records of the said board as of the same force and effect as if decided by the said board in accordance with their usual procedure. The council of representatives, during deliberations. should hold joint sessions with said board of trustees.

(Note-This plan is in use by the California Fruit Growers' exchange, and while affording the necessary security to larger districts, if conditions should require it, yet the council has not been called into service during the last six years.

9. The principal functions of the eentral exchange should be the distribution and marketing of fruit and the gathering and dissemination of market information.

10. The by-laws of the central exchange should be subject to amendment only by vote of two-thirds of all trustees, and any amendment thus adopted should be subject to referendum to all district organizations at-


