### EDUCATIONAL FILM AT ISIS.

"The Declaration of Independence," an Edison Masterpiece.

Manager Sherwood has secured for tonight and tomorrow a special feature film which should be seen by everybody.

Following its interesting predecessors in the historical series, this film tells in story form how the opinion gradually took shape that the American colonies were and ought to be free and independent states and how the representatives of the colonies got together and sent that opinion forth to the world in the form known as the Declaration of Independence.

In the first continental congress held in Carpenters Hall, John Adams' speech for independence and his denunciation of the king and his methods are disallowed and a petition is sent to the king. We see the receipt of this petition by King George the Third and his answer that the sword shall put down the rebels. Thus when congress meets again, this time in Independence Hall in Philadelphia and Adams make a speech advocating independence which follows hard upon the answer from the king, it is received with acclamation.

We see Jefferson writing the declaration with extracts from the famous document and the next morning the argument and final adoption of it by congress, while John Adams' son, afterward the sixth president of the United States, has stationed himself at the door to listen for the news so that he may notify the old bell ringer in the tower of Independence hall and enable him to send the news broadcast through the city by the iron tongue of the old liberty bell.

The story moves along clearly and distinctly and is interesting quite aside from its historical value by reason of the strong individualities and faithful depiction of the types and manners of the day. Adams, Jefferson and old Benj. Franklin seem to live again before our eyes and we get something of the feeling that must stir when, for the independence of the colonies and their kindred, they pledged each other, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence, their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.

The film is staged with the usual Edison lavishness and attention to every detail.
