Evangelistic services at 11 a. m., 2:30 p. m. and again at 7 p. m.

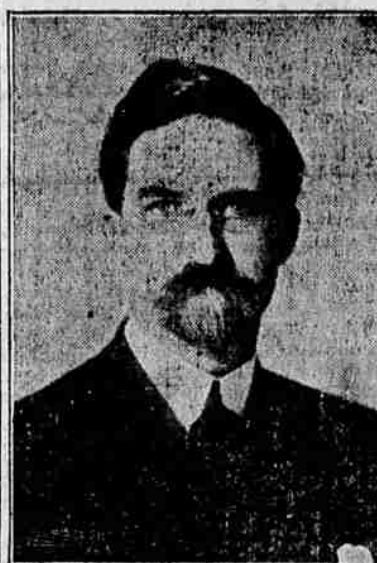
First Presbyterian Church.
