YUAN SHI KAI.

The One Man Believed Capable of Suppressing the Chinese Rebellion.

Yuan Shi Kai, China's last, best card, has been recalled to power and ordered to the seat of war to suppress the rebellion.

Formerly grand councillor and commander in chief of the army and navy, he was shorn of his honors and banished from the capital not quite three years ago, for his Chinese blood had aroused Manchu jealousy. But he is known as a strong man. He first organized the northern modern army, and it is believed that he is the only man around whom the loyal troops will rally.

Yuan Shi Kai is a man of brains and modern ideas and has always been a friend to foreigners and a believer in their military methods. In 1904 this level headed reformer and honest financier was made commander of China's northern army, with headquarters at Tientsin. Under him this army became the most proficient in the empire, European drill succeeding stinkpot war methods.

Emperor Kwangsu intrust-

ed to him his extensive reforms and even commissioned him to seize the dowager Empress Tausi. Yuan apparently betrayed this plan, and when the emperor became a virtual prisoner the dowager heaped honors upon Yuan until for a lack of time he was compelled to resign posts that paid \$100,000.

Despite the empress, Yuan fought Boxerism and had some of its leaders shot.

When the empress set on foot her "war against the world" he and a few others prevented the spread of fighting and won the good will of the foreign world.

HE BORROWED MONEY.

And Yet He Had More Cash in Bank Than He Could Use.

One morning last year I sat in the office of the head of a very large business, one of the shrewdest men I know. His cashier came in and laid on his desk a report of the cash in the bank. The amount exceeded \$400,000.

"That's a pretty big balance," said my friend to his clerk. "It's much more than we need in this business. But we have borrowed no money for several months, so I wish you would send to each of our banks a note for \$100,000."

When the clerk went out I expressed surprise at this action. For a man to borrow \$200,000 when he had more money than he could use seemed to me a wasteful proceeding.

"I do it," he said "to keep my credit alive. I want the banks accustomed to lending me money. I want them to regard a good line of credit as a regular thing with me. Some time I may need it, and when I do I want to have it ready and waiting. An established credit is a big asset, and the only way to get and keep it is to constantly employ it."

I have thought of that action a good many times since. I had always prided myself on not borrowing money, and I paid cash on the spot for every-

thing that I bought. I looked upon people who bought things on credit as rather poor financiers.

But a few months ago I wanted some money—a small amount and for only a month. I went to a bank where I had kept a deposit for over fifteen years, and they asked me to deposit good bonds as collateral to the full amount of the loan. My friend could borrow by simply signing a note. I had to give ample security. Matson Hale in National Monthly.
