**FOUR GAMES IN A WEEK SCHED-  
ULE NOW PREPARED.**

**North Powder Tonight—Union Teams  
Coming—Girls to Have Tryout.**

Ready to meet the North Powder  
five tonight and then prepare for a  
holiday journey through Wallowa  
county playing three games there the  
next week-end is the strenuous out-  
line facing the high school five the  
next seven days. The game tonight  
commences at 8:30 o'clock and fans  
will see the same faces that have per-  
formed with the globe the two games  
already played. Holiday shoppers will  
thus get a chance to attend the game  
later in the evening. The five is rapidly  
losing its rough edges, and is  
ready to put up a clever line of ball.

One game at Wallowa Thursday  
evening, two at Enterprise on Friday  
and Saturday constitutes the schedule  
to be carried out on the Wallowa trip  
which the high school five undertakes  
next week. Manager Bohnenkamp will  
take an augmented squad along to get  
the best possible results but the men  
will work on new and cramped floors  
and at Enterprise especially will they  
clash with fast men. It is anticipated  
that the Enterprise high school games  
will be strenuous indeed, but deter-  
mined to win all games played the  
youths from here will undertake to  
carry away triple scalps from the sis-  
ter county.

On December 30th the city team  
featuring Hollister, Lindsey, Bean and  
Bean and Geddes will journey to Cove  
to meet a city team there.

Union high school boys' and girls'  
teams are coming to La Grande early  
in January for a dual conflict with the  
La Grande boys and girls. Last year  
the Union team trimmed the La  
Grande boys once and the girls' teams  
mixed it twice with the locals win-  
ning both games. Consequently there  
are old rivalry scores to be settled and  
the double header should draw well.

Next Friday the annual tryout of the  
girls' teams in the high school will be  
held at the school's gym. Manager  
Olive Masee and her co-officials will  
send out two or three squads during  
the game and on the showing made by  
the group will be picked a more or  
less permanent fixture for each pos-  
ition. The game will either be classi-  
fied as an interclass affair or some  
other suitable arrangement made to  
get enthusiasm into the playing.

From Baker comes news that en-

that Baker would not have a team this  
year, but a reconsideration leads to

tively of the boys' team last year.

Commenting on the game last night  
with Columbia college the Pendleton  
East Oregonian said Thursday night:  
"Tomorrow night in the high school  
gymnasium the first interscholastic  
game of basketball of the series  
which will decide the championship  
of Eastern Oregon will be played the

Columbia College, Jr., of Milton. Last  
year the local school captured the
