MRS. WINN, 80, PASSES AWAY

STURDY PIONEER CHARACTER PASSES SUNDAY.

Late Husband Helped Run Down the Notorious John D. Lee.

Early Sunday morning in South La Grande occurred the death of one of the sturdy pioneer women of this region. Mrs. Phoebe Winn was born at Orton in Illinois in 1832, February 29. At the age of 19 she married Thomas G. Winn who preceded her to the spirit land three years since. At once after their marriage they came west, residing in Utah a number of years. Mr. Winn was one of the brave officers who traced down and captured that monster, John D. Lee, for his complicity in the infamous Mountain Meadow massacre of 1857, and for which Lee was executed in 1877.

These parents had 12 children, four being girls, and all are living. Some are in Montana, some in Colorado, and some in Oregon and Utah. For months Mrs. Winn had been seriously ailing for months, and had the best of unselfish and undeviating attention. The funeral took place Christmas morning from the home of her son John. Dr. Gillilan of the Methodist church officiated at the obsequies.

HUNTLEY MUST STAND TRIAL

MAN ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF CARRYING WEAPONS.

Big Gun Plainly Evident When He Is Arraigned in Police Court.

When is a weapon concealed? This is the subject that Police Judge Humphreys will have to decide tomorrow at 2:30 o'clock when Leonard Huntley, a tinner employed in the O. W. shops, is put on trial for carrying concealed weapons. Huntley is a La Grande man, and was arrested yesterday for "toting" a gun, but pleaded not guilty when arraigned this afternoon on the charge. He asserts he was not given protection and therefore took advantage of the law which allows a man the right to carry firearms provided that are not concealed. The police department says that he has not asked for protection and has at no time reported himself in trouble with strikers.

Even at the time he was arraigned today he carried his big revolver, the holster hanging from a belt so that when his coats were unbuttoned the weapon could be seen. He will be given his trial tomorrow.

New Agency for Reforms.
Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 26.—A new movement to aid in the uplift of the masses and to correct the abuses from which they are supposed to be suffering was formally launched here today at the initial convention of the Indiana State Civic union. The purpose of the new organization, as set

forth by its promoters, is to obtain social, civic and moral reform by means of education, legislation and law enforcement. Some of the issues which it purposes to take up will be Sabbath observance, social purity, temperance, sanitation, industrial equity and international peace.

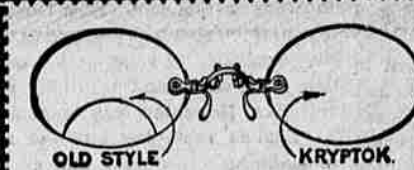
