STOLEN SILVER FOUND

LA GRANDE POLICE ARREST FELLOW WHO BURGLARIZED.

Youth Returned to Pendleton Where Stolen Goods Belonged.

In the arrest here yesterday morning by La Grande police of a young man from Pendleton they paved the way for the return to a Pendleton family of a big list of silverware. Sheriff Taylor arrived last night to take possession of the alleged thief. Details of the robbery are explained this way in the Pendleton East Oregonian last evening:

After ransacking the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Earle last evening, securing a silver toilet set and several articles of clothing, and making a getaway, a burglar, name unknown, had a short lived enjoyment of his ill-gotten plunder, the officers of La Grande apprehending and arresting him this morning upon receiving a telephonic description of the stolen property from local officers.

Mr. and Mrs. Earle, who live at 301 East Alta street, left their home shortly after 6 o'clock last evening for a short call upon friends, and following their usual custom, left the doors unlocked for the two young men who have rooms in their house. Upon their return a short time afterward, Mrs. Earle discovered her silver toilet set missing and an investigation showed burnt matches on the floors in several rooms.

Their first impression was that they had been the victims of some practical joker among their friends, but upon discovery of the burnt matches, they were convinced that a burglar had visited them. Upon the return of Marshal Spell, who rooms with the Earles, it was discovered that the marauder had also taken an overcoat, a black suit, pair of shoes and a sweater belonging to him, and a suit case belonging to Mr. Earle.

The officers were at once notified and furnished with a description of the stolen property. Messages were sent over the wires to other towns and cities with the result that the La Grande officers picked the guilty person up this morning. At the time of his arrest, he was wearing the stolen suit and overcoat and had all of his plunder except the silverware which has not yet been discovered.

O. A. C.—UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS CALL FOR RESOLUTION.

Lottes Throws Blanchett of Hot Lake in Two Straight Falls.

Resolutions favoring and urging the speedy re-cementing of athletic relations between the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college, were passed last night at a chill spread at Selder's attended by students of both institutions and alumni. The resolution followed a talk-fee in which both O. A. C. and Oregon students participated and the universal desire of alumni and students to get the two schools on a friendly athletic basis again were discussed and mentioned in several post-soup addresses. Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to the Eastern Oregon club at O. A. C. and to the University as well.

The actual underlying cause for the severed relations the past year or so was aptly expressed by Charles Reynolds, quarterback on the O. A. C. team at the time the rupture occurred at Corvallis. "It is not the athletes who carry rivalry to extremes or are in any way responsible for ruptures such as these. It is the rank and file of the rooters' contingent—the athletes of one school instinctively reverent and are always friendly to athletes of other schools for no one but themselves know the nature of the thorny and laborious path that leads from athletic oblivion to glory and renown." Mr. Reynolds continued his clever speech by urging every college man
