

WILDE FIGURES IN 2 SCANDALS

EVIDENCE IS STOLEN FROM PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE

WILDE'S AGENTS BLAMED FOR THE LOSS BY PROSECUTOR

Wilde Replies Anggrily, Saying It Is a Plot to Get Out From Under the Case Which the State "Has Not Perfected Against Me" Says Wilde—Entrance Gained From Transom in Office.

Portland, Jan. 2.—Offices of District Attorney Cameron and of E. Clark, special prosecutor against Louis Wilde the San Diego banker, were entered through a transom, and valuable evidence against Wilde was stolen. This is the second sensational development in the Wilde case. The first was that the grand jury which indicted him had been tampered with and Wilde was still snarling under the effects of it when this charge is preferred. The nature of the evidence said to have been stolen is not made known, but as the case against Wilde, charging him with embezzling \$90,000 from the defunct Oregon Trust & Savings bank, is set for January 8th, it may create considerable delay.

Calls It Another Plot.

Cameron's statement that the jury had been tampered with was pronounced as a plot, and now Wilde makes another similar charge in answer to the news that the officers' evidence was stolen.

Wilde said today: "Cameron charges that my agents did it is a damnable plot to blacken my name, and give the prosecution a chance to get to me. They didn't have a case, but use this means to get out from under it."

In Cameron's office the desks were broken into and bankbooks holding evidence against Wilde were torn and all parts referring to Wilde taken; also cancelled checks and other documentary evidence. In Clark's office in the Yeon building, the door was taken from its hinges. His strong box was opened and a list of the witnesses for the prosecution was taken. The robberies follow recrimination between the attorneys who are very bitter.

JOHNSON TO FIGHT FLYNN.

Will Meet Fireman in Nevada in June or July.

Chicago, Jan. 2.—Jack Johnson today declared he has practically promised to meet Jim Flynn either in June or July to fight at Windward Nevada, 100 miles west of Salt Lake. Johnson said he would get \$20,000 and a third interest in the pictures, for the services. Jack Curley is engineering the deal. If Johnson does fight, it will not necessarily interfere with the proposed Australian trip.

RUMBLINGS SCARE MANY CITIES AT NOON.

Guards at Penitentiary Alarmed— Dishes Rattled in Chicago.

Chicago, Jan. 2.—A slight earthquake rocked Chicago today and rattled dishes. Some were scared by the underground rumbling. The earthquake was felt throughout northern Illinois.

At Joliet several buildings rocked and greatly alarmed the inhabitants. The quake frightened the penitentiary convicts. It was also felt at DeKalb, Aurora, Lockport, Yorkville, and Waukegan. The last earthquake felt here was in 1900.

The Campaign in Arkansas.

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 2.—Following a truce extending over the holidays, the senatorial and gubernatorial campaigns in Arkansas reopened today with renewed activity on all sides. Tons of literature bearing upon the liquor issue are being distributed from the headquarters of Governor Donaghey, who is a candidate for a third term. Similar activity is displayed in the camp of Congressman Joe T. Robinson, who is Governor Donaghey's opponent for the nomination. Equalling the gubernatorial contest in public interest and surpassing it in bitterness is the senatorial fight between Senator Jeff Davis and former Congressman Brundidge.

TAFT FORCING ROOSEVELT

Washington, D. C., Jan. 2.—Political circles this afternoon are astounded by the report credited to Taft leaders that the president is determined to force Roosevelt into the open in a contest for the presidential nomination. The rumor, which, while house attaches would not discuss it, was that Secretary Hilles is en route to New York to tell Roosevelt that Taft will withdraw if Roosevelt is really a candidate for the renomination.

PERSIANS HANG TO QUELL LUST

CRY FOR BLOOD FROM RUSSIA ANSWERED FRIGHTFULLY

EIGHT HANGED TODAY TO PACIFY BLOOD LUST AT TABRIZ

Eight Hangings Every Day Is Schedule of Atrocities Outlined by the Russians—Men Dragged Through the Streets and Bayoneted by the Troops Who Entered State Without War Ceremonies.

Tabriz, Jan. 2.—The fearful reprisals by Russian troops were continued today. Eight more Persian patriots were hanged here because they tried to oppose the Russians who invaded Persia without a declaration of war. Their bodies were dragged through the streets and bayoneted. It is feared 100 will be killed to show that Russia will not tolerate opposition.

It is believed that the Russians plan to hang eight patriots daily until the blood lust is satisfied.

To Probe Election Frauds.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 2.—Pursuant to the call of Governor Dix an extraordinary term of the supreme court, with a grand jury, convened here today to consider the evidence relating to the alleged commission of crime in Albany county, particularly in reference to crime against the elective franchise and matters brought out by the senate investigation into affairs of the city and county of Albany. Supreme Court Justice John W. Goff of New York is presiding over the special term of the court. Justice Goff was counsel to the so-called Lexow committee, which investigated conditions in New York and was associated with Mayor Gaynor in the prosecution of the alleged election frauds in Kings county several years ago.

To Elect Ollie James Senator.

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 2.—The biennial session of the Kentucky legislature convened today in the new capitol. A United States senator is to be elected to succeed Senator Thomas H. Paynter, but the election will be more formally as the democratic majority is bound to vote for Congressman Ollie James, who was unopposed for the senatorship in the November primaries.

AIM AT TRUST VIA ATTORNEY

GOVERNOR MARSHALL INTRODUCES NEW VENTURE

HOLD LAWYERS JOINTLY GUILTY WITH TRUSTS

Counsel for Big Business Deals Should Be Held Responsible Along With the Trusts Is the Opinion of Governor Marshall of Indiana—Will Foment Such a Measure for Adoption.

Indianapolis, Jan. 2.—Federal legislation that will make lawyers who aid in the formation of trusts, equally guilty with the corporation, is proposed here today by Governor Marshall. "Some lawyers," he said, "assume their duties to their clients involve the right for them to be parties to a criminal transaction. They should be held equally responsible."

Marshall first broached the matter at the Jackson club banquet last evening. Today he amplified his remarks by saying: "This would be a step in the solution of the big business problem."

"Lawyers should be made accessories before the fact for the corporations in violation of the anti-trust laws. In case they are proven guilty, the same as a drug clerk, who knowingly sells poison for murder."

Farmers Attend School.

Lexington, Ky., Jan. 2.—Scores of progressive farmers and stock raisers left their homes in various parts of the state today, with Lexington as their destination, and at noon they began to arrive on every train, all prepared to attend the annual Institute at the State College of Agriculture, one of the principal events of the year in Kentucky agricultural circles. During the week there will be conventions of breeders of dairy and beef cattle, swine, sheep and horses, together with exhibitions and daily lectures of special interest to the corn growers, dairymen and horticulturists.

SEPERATE TRIAL FOR LABOR MEN

JOB HARRIMAN SAYS DEFENDANTS DESERVE HELP.

Ten Day's Time Allowed to Make Plea In—Defendants Arraigned.

Los Angeles, Jan. 2.—Before entering the courtroom where Tiveltmoe, Johanssen and Munsey were arraigned today, for complicity in the Times dynamiting conspiracy, Attorney Job Harriman said: "These men are entitled to the support of the laboring people. I am sure they will get it. The case will be fought to a finish."

Clancey is sick in San Francisco and was not arraigned this morning. He is at liberty under a surety bond and it is unknown when he will be arraigned. It is reported that McManigal, who is now enroute to Indianapolis maybe will get immunity. A separate trial will be asked. In court each defendant waived reading of the indictments charging conspiracy of transporting dynamite in violation of the federal laws. The defendants' request for ten days to decide upon a plea was allowed by Judge Welborn who set January 12th as the day for them to plead.

KNOCKOUT DROPS APPLIED.

Ukiah Editor Waylaid and Robbed and Hurried to Canadian Soil.

Ukiah, Cal., Jan. 2.—Telling a story of having been given "knockout drops" in a San Francisco water front saloon and having awakened somewhere near Calgary, Alberta, with \$450 gone, Clax Halliday, a young Ukiah editor, who disappeared in December, is home again. He walked the ties most of the way. He went to San Francisco to pay his paper bill.

Start Campaign for Woman's Ballot.

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 2.—A plan of campaign that calls for rallies in every large city and town of the state was inaugurated by the Wisconsin Woman's Suffrage association today with a meeting at Waukesha. In addition to the Wisconsin leaders the speakers in the state wide campaign will include Rec. Caroline Bartlett Crane, Rachel Foster Avery and other equal rights advocates of national reputation.

Charles H. Hyde to the Bar.

New York, Jan. 2.—The case of Charles H. Hyde, the former city chamberlain who is charged with accepting a bribe to deposit city money in the Carnegie Trust company, was called in the supreme court today for trial.

Third Trial Delayed.

Kansas City, Jan. 2.—The third trial of Dr. Hyde for the Swope poisoning was continued until May 27. The state asked the continuance and Dr. Hyde is at liberty until then.

MANCHU TROOPS QUIT IN HORDES

MARCH AGAINST PEKING FROM TWO DIRECTIONS

SENATE ASKS HIS CABINET TO AID THE REPUBLIC

Yi's Resignation and Is Out of Office, Yuan Being Glad to Get It—Re-Armies Swell by Manchu Soldiers Who Quit Army Ranks to Join War Revolution—Heart of Manchu Gone.

Tien Tsin, Jan. 2.—Imperial troops stationed at Lan Chow, the capital of Kwang Su in Northern China have deserted the Manchus and joined the rebels. Tomorrow, under the command of General Wang, once one of the premier's trusted deputies, they will start to march on Peking. Simultaneously the revolutionists in the southern part of the country, will begin a northward march on Peking. Its fall seems inevitable as thousands of troops have deserted.

The troops were persuaded to desert by the rebels, who promised to pay regularly something the imperial government is not doing. It is reported that the dowager empress is fleeing toward Russia from Peking.

The troops comprise practically all the imperial army in Kwang Su. As they have heretofore been the most loyal, the desertion is a severe blow to the throne. Other troops have followed the wholesale desertion, and it is taken as a sign of the ultimate total disintegration of the Manchu dynasty.

Sen Names Cabinet.

Nanking, Jan. 2.—Incagurated as the president of the Chinese republic Sun Yat Sen today named his cabinet of ultra progressives. Wu Ting Fang is made minister of foreign affairs. Ching Tao was appointed minister of finance. His anti-Wu's selection are expected to aid in establishing close relations with the United States and Europe.

Yi Resigns Office.

Shanghai, Jan. 2.—Satisfied that his tenure of office ends with the final collapse of the Manchu dynasty, Premier Yuan has accepted Tang Shao Yi's resignation, because he is displeased with Tang's surrender to the rebels. It is reported that Yuan is planning to continue the fight to kill the revolution as soon as the army armistice is ended. It is said the Manchu princes have given funds to do this from their private purses. Yuan will negotiate further with Wu Ting Fang and it is understood that he wants a powerful place in the new government if he quits the Manchus.

Emperor Headed for Russia.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 2.—Semi-official dispatches received here from Peking say the dowager empress accompanied by the emperor are fleeing, disguised, toward Zhikhe on the Mongolian frontier. It is believed they intend to place themselves under the protection of Russia.

Miss Fickle Improving.

Reports from the hospital state that Miss Fickle of Union is rapidly recovering after a long siege of illness.

M'MANIGAL ON HIS WAY EAST

WILL TESTIFY BEFORE INDIANA POLIS JURY.

Departure From Los Angeles Is Secret and Very Quiet.

Los Angeles, Jan. 2.—McManigal today is speeding toward Indianapolis in the custody of Malcolm McLaren of the Burns detective agency and Under Sheriff Brain. They left quietly last night within two hours after McLaren had said they would go east before the middle of the month. They took the Santa Fe. McManigal will be the star witness in the Indianapolis investigation.
