WILL START TAXI SERVICE. Auto-Taxi Scheme Afoot to Be Adjusted According to Demand.

Forerunning actual importation of taxicabs, the L. C. Smith garage has opened an auto-taxi service here

which is aimed to grow into a regular taxi service. To begin with the service will constitute a regular automobile run on taxi fashion. Any call to any part of the city will be answered, measuring the distance traveled from some down town point, probably Depot and Adams. No call for less than 50 cents is the present arrangement, and after a half mile has been traversed, regular taxi rates, less a slight reduction yet to be announced, will be charged. If the plan works satisfactorily taxis will be imported and put on the service. For under one-half mile, prices are the same for one fare as for four.

"Quick and speedy service is our keynote now, and the actual rates will be established as soon as they can be worked out for the different sections of the city," said Mr. Smith in announcing his service.

Untimely Death of Mrs. Meyers at Portland Explained in Letter.

Further information than that contained in the Sunday Portland papers relative to the untimely death of Mrs. Meyers, formerly a resident of Summerville and La Grande, is contained in a letter to Mrs. Turner Oliver today from Portland friends. Mrs. Meyers who is the daughter of James Rinehart, now of Portland, but for many years a resident of Union county, and was an aunt of Carl and Fred Dittbrandt of this city, had many warm friends in La Grande. She was overcome by gas fumes in her bath room and died before she could be rushed to the hospital. She is survived by a child.
