REGISTER FOR PRIMARY NOW

BOOKS OPENED TODAY AND THE CAMPAIGN IS ON.

Essential That Voters Attend to This Matter This Year.

Registration for the primary nominating election in April began today when County Clerk Ed Wright opened the registration books at the court house. A campaign to get the voters of the county on the registration books will be waged, for the presidential election next fall will of course bring out a large voting contingent and the full voting strength of the county should be shown on the registration books.

The books which opened today will remain open until April 9th at which time they close for the primary election, to be re-opened as soon as the primary is over. This will be on April 24th and from then on until May 15, when the voters can again register for the fall election.

In view of the fact that this is presidential year County Clerk Wright anticipates a large registration. Registration blanks have been sent to all outlying precincts and voters can register before the justice of the peace of their respective districts at any time, but in La Grande it will be necessary to appear before the county clerk to dispose of this highly important matter.

Those who have in the past years been inconvenienced and detained and worried over the lethargy of others are going to make themselves committees of one this year to get out a bigger registration. It is frequently a fact that some cheery voter asserts he is too busy to register but when the election time comes around he is required to spend several minutes and undergo inconvenience that the cheery one may cast his vote. "It is indeed a most important proposition and any person who is not considerate enough of others' good nature to attend to registration needs retouching along the line of good manners," is the way one politician sized the matter up today.

PHONOGRAPHS ARE INSTALLED

GIFT OF \$30 AIDS FUND TO BUY INSTRUMENTS.

Metropolitan Methods of Music Teaching Instituted in La Grande

Two Columbia phonographs aggregating a cost of \$114.85 were installed in the schools of the city today by Superintendent Stout and regular concerts will be held from time to time in the grade buildings and high school from now on. Only standard grades of records will be used and from time to time the grand opera selections and band numbers will be added to the collection.

Gift Helps Scheme. With about \$50 realized from the program some time ago for that purpose and a gift of \$30 by A. T. Hill, the phonograph plan is installed at little outlay to the school district. At present there are 32 records for use in the schools and these will be used to good advantage. Mr. Hill who handles the Columbia cabinet phonograph made the school a gift of \$30 to aid in the purchase price of the instruments and the school is indeed grateful for the gift. It starts the system off with a substantial beginning. Regular assemblies will hear the programs from the big machines whereby Superintendent Stout hopes to cultivate and to educate the musical ears of the pupils. The plan is a very popular one throughout the big schools of the east where children either are too poor to attend or too remotely located to be present at grand operas

are given a splendid acquaintance with the best in the musical world. Tetrazzina, Caruso, Melba, Schumann-Heinke and the entire category of musical stars will be brought before the La Grande schools in this way.

Boston's Plan to Elevate the Drama.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 2.—Plays never given professionally in Boston, and plays never before offered on any stage, are to be presented at the Toy theater, which has its formal opening in this city tonight. The Toy theatre is designed for the elevation of the drama, and is to be conducted along the same lines as the New theater attempted in New York, only on a less pretentious scale. Many prominent society people, writers and musicians of Boston are interested in the enterprise. The services of all persons taking part in the performances are to be given free. The season will run for eight alternate weeks, and every fortnight a new play will be produced. Two short plays, "In His House," by George Middleton, and "Press Cuttings," by George Bernard Shaw, have been selected for the opening.

Henry M. Flagler is Eighty-two.

New York, Jan. 2.—Henry M. Flagler, for many years one of the controlling factors in the Standard Oil corporation, reached his 82nd birthday anniversary today. Mr. Flagler, in accordance with the custom he has followed for many years, is spending the winter in the south. Later in the month he is to be the central figure at the big celebration in honor of the opening of the overseas division of the Florida East Coast railway. Mr. Flagler has spent millions of dollars in the construction of this line, which will afford direct communication between Key West and the mainland.

Importers Automobile Salon.

New York, Jan. 2.—Seventeen different makes of foreign built automobiles were displayed in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Astor today at the opening of the annual Importers' Automobile Salon. Practically every well known foreign car which has achieved distinction either here or abroad is included among the exhibits. As the name implies, the exhibition is strictly a drawing room affair, and not an industrial show. Commercial vehicles are excluded, and a leading feature is the magnificent bodies, mounted on the various cars, which exemplify the

latest productions of the famous coach builders of Europe and America.
