# LIVESTOCK IS HOLDING FIRM

ALL LINES STAND UP WELL, AND PRICES GOOD.

**Turkeys Continue to Arrive at Portland Markets This Week.**

Weekly resume of Portland and general markets, issued from Portland Tuesday afternoon, follows:

Strength continues in all lines of livestock. The advance in the price of hogs, was fully maintained today, although there was only a very limited number coming forward to test the grade.

The weaker feeling which has existed in the swine trade at competitive points recently has in a measure reduced the great differential that has existed between the price here and the cost of landing supplies from the Missouri river territory. However, today's advices, while telling of a weaker and lower price at South Omaha, makes the top there 2 1/2c above what it was last week, therefore forcing this addition to the cost of bringing stock here from there. On the basis of today's values at the Missouri river market, eastern swine cost \$7.27 1/2 to land here and at other Pacific northwest points. The best price available recently here has been \$6.75, which still makes the differential between the local price and the cost of getting eastern supplies here very heavy.

Today's run of hogs at North Portland, 314 head, compares with 449 head received both Monday and Tuesday of last week, Monday being a holiday.

Hogs were steady at Chicago today, with a run of 26,000 head, compared with 18,000 a year ago. Tops sold there at \$6.25 which price was received for mixed and for good and heavy lots.

At Kansas City there was a steady tone in the hog trade with a run of 15,000 head.

At South Omaha, while hogs were weaker and lower, tops sold up to \$6.17 1/2.

Best packers, \$2.75; good heavy, at \$6.50 to \$6.60; good light, \$6.50 to \$6.60; Rough and heavy, \$6.25; poor and heavy, \$5.25 to \$5.50.

**Turkey Shipments Continue.**  
Evidently figuring that there is always a demand for turkeys no matter when shipped, some shippers continue to send forward large numbers of dressed birds, while during the greatest demand they refused to let go.

At the best there is only a nominal call for turkeys at this time. The market was nominally placed at 21@23c a pound this morning by the trade, but as there were no sales made at this range during the morning, it would be hard to tell what the exact price is.

Shipments of dressed turkeys to the Front street trade during the time intervening since the close of business Saturday, were unusually liberal and supplies hung along the wholesale district this morning resemble holiday time.

Not only are many dressed turkeys coming forward at this time but the trade is being liberally supplied with live turkeys while a short time ago they could not be had at any price. As for dressed stock the market is extremely limited.

The potato market has started the new year with only a nominal demand from the outside.

While weather conditions at this time are against the shipment of potatoes to the south or the southwest, shippers say that even without this drawback the market is extremely limited.

Practically all of the small present business in the potato market is confined to seed stock. This is going to Southern California. Shipments consist entirely of American Wonders and for these the price remains active at \$1.50 per cental, f. o. b., country shipping points.

Table stock is quiet. While a very small amount of speculative business is passing for the account of the Arizona and middle California trade, business is of extremely small volume and prices are exactly the same as have been quoted during the past ten days.

Local potato market is not very active. Jobbing demand is being quite

well taken care of by former speculators who are now seemingly anxious to unload with as little delay as possible.

**Dressed Meats Are Firm.**

All through the dressed meat market prices continue to hold very firm. Dressed hogs are at last feeling the effects of the improved demand for meats, caused by colder weather. The sales of fancy are being made at 9@9 1/2c a pound.

Dressed veal remains firm with no change in prices from the high point of last week.

**Eggs Are Holding Steady.**

Prices in the egg market are, as a rule, steady along Front street today. Receipts are quite fair and this is keeping the market down. Some are shading values a fraction.

With the cooler weather there is a slightly increased output of cold storage stock around 1.28c for best.

**Celery to Be Scarce.**

Owing to the unfavorable weather in the south and the higher prices ruling there, local stocks of celery are rather limited and the market is holding firm at \$1 for best offerings. No further shipments are due from the south until Thursday or Friday.

**Fresh Japanese Oranges.**

A fresh shipment of oranges from Japan via the north arrived on the local market today in good condition and sales are continued at \$1.25 per bundle.

California tangerines are in more liberal supply and as they are of better quality than the imported stock, demand is increasing at \$1.50@1.75 per half orange box.

**Grape Market Overstocked.**

Market is quite heavily stocked with grapes at this time. Front street has a greater stock on hand at this time than ever before at this season and prices are more reasonable. Quality
