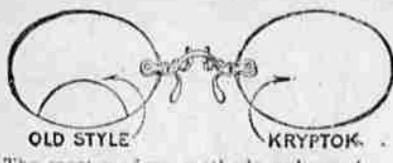

LOCAL CLUB'S AID SOUGHT

zens, is being thus opposed because it is a gross injustice to present water users in that it would without any good excuse, provocation or necessity deprive them of all opportunity for placing further lands under irrigation, the water of the streams flowing through their own lands and adjacent having always been regarded as available whenever needed and as rapidly as the lands could be developed profitably. Using this water for the irrigation of the lands of the Western Umatilla project, sixty miles away, would leave permanently arid many thousand acres of lands in the upper valley, for which there is absolutely no other source of water supply than the Umatilla and its tributaries, while for the West Umatilla project there is ample other supply.

We favor "Justice for Oregon." We favor Oregon being given her share of the money that is loaned out of the reclamation funds, which is nearly \$11,000,000.

We favor construction of the West Umatilla project on a sane plan that will secure every beneficial result without the grave dangers and other objectionable features of the present plan of the United States reclamation service.

We refer to what is known as the "Mariner plan," backed by Dr. Blalock which provided for the use of all the drainage or waste waters from the present Umatilla project, supplemented by sufficient water from the John Day river in a way that has been investigated and outlined by competent engineers and reported feasible and economical.

By the "Mariner plan" the cost will be about \$40 per acre as against \$80 by this extravagantly expensive present plan of the United States reclamation service.

We want to save to the future settler this \$40 excess charge which the reclamation service wants spent to provide them with fat jobs.

We want to save disappointment to future settlers by insurance of ample water supply and not repeat the Hon-do flasco.

It would be imprudent, foolish and criminally wrong to undertake the construction of the West Umatilla project on mere "assuming" since the Umatilla system water rights have never been adjudicated.

Who beside the reclamation service favors the present plan?

W. M. Ladd, the Oregon Land and Water company owner of about 29,000 acres of the lands to be irrigated, and the Northern Pacific railway, owner of several thousand acres more; beside these there are certain subservient newspapers, the Oregon Development league, which is largely dominated by this corporate influence, the paid lobbyists and C. C. Chapman.

What do they seek? To get these immense land holdings, amounting to 80 per cent of all the lands in the proposed project, provided with irrigation so that they can "unload" at 100 or more times what the lands are worth in their present condition and put the "profits" of the deal in their pockets. They are willing to disregard entirely the natural rights of the present settlers to the waters they desire to confiscate, they are too utterly selfish to care whether the future settlers are provided with sufficient water or not, if only they can hurry this scheme through and sell out.

We quite agree with the resolutions sent out by Mr. Chapman so far as they go. But they do not go far enough. They should insist on this project being watered in the most economical way and the way that will safeguard the interests of present and future settlers. These lands ought to be irrigated and if reclamation funds are loaned for work in Oregon there is no place where such assurance of good and valuable results exists as right here.

Therefore we suggest that either no action be taken at all, or that your club add to the resolutions sent you, the following resolution:

Be It Further Resolved, That the source of water supply should be unquestionably ample and safe and economical as to cost, probably what is known as the "Mariner plan," using the seepage or waste water of the tilla project, supplemented by sufficient water from the John Day river.
