

UNION FIVES COMING FRIDAY

BOTH GAMES TO BE PLAYED AT ONE TIME.

General Sport News, for the Week Is Summarized Briefly.

For the first time this year a double header is to be played at the high school gym when next Friday night Union high school will send over a team of boys and a team of girls. The boys' team from Union is not the one which played the M. I. A. a week ago. Last year the Union five was able to defeat La Grande's boys and hope to repeat. The Union girls on the same mission will come prepared to take the measure of the local girls who thus far have not played any games whatever. Student coaching has been the rule with the girls' team this year and Bohnenkamp and Bolton have had charge of the squad, drilling them in the intricate points of the game. One weak place, at guard, is being filled with Miss Anthony in the most promising manner and the team will go against Union in a well balanced condition.

The Enterprise News-Record scribe raves and tears his hair and purchase may take to sackcloth and ashes over the refusal of the La Grande basketball team to play at Enterprise last Saturday night without the privilege of naming one official. The Record takes the position it was not the theory that Enterprise objected to but the individual. Then, too, it says "After vainly trying to pull Enterprise boys' legs for expense money the La Granders returned home." It is within reason that a visiting team should be paid its expense money if we know anything about century old rules.

Between \$200 and \$300 more was spent in Union county in 1911 for hunting and fishing licenses than in 1910. The total licenses issued by County Clerk Wright for 1911 numbers 2,063 which represents the aggregate for both the hunting and fishing licenses. The new ruling forbidding the use of telephone or "a friend" in securing a license will no doubt work a hardship, imagined or real, at first, but as soon as the nimrods and Isaac Waltons familiarize themselves with conditions the new law should not be bothersome to anyone, except maybe to the clerk's office in being required to deny telephone requests for licenses.

Preliminary negotiations for a game between Cove and the La Grande city team for January 10th are on but Man-

nger Bean has not been able to finally close the contract as yet. The first big scheduled games with the city team are those with Pendleton high school and Milton early next month.

Infielder Shutt who played third base with Joseph when the four-team club existed a few years ago, has been ordered to report to McCredie for a workout for the Portland club in the Northwest league next year. Another infielder of this section who is being urged to make a stab at things higher up is Hooper of Elgin. Hooper is a first class stickler and fast enough on bases to make himself presentable to the big moguls for a workout next season at least.

With the lineup of the team changed because of the departure of Chapman, the crack forward, for California and because of the injury of Strain, the Pendleton high basketball players left this afternoon for Milton where tonight they will meet the quintet of Columbia college in the second contest of the season between these two aggregations. Although handicapped by the absence of the two forwards, the local boys expect to duplicate their victory of two weeks ago when on their home floor they trimmed the fruitgrowers by the score of 27 to 14.

The first lineup of the Pendleton team will be Sturdivant and Fee, forwards; Houser, center; and Jordan and Thompson, guards. Strain will accompany the team to go in a forward if needed, although he has a bad foot, and Hampton will act as substitute guard. Fee, who has been serving in a guard position, has been switched to forward and with his speed and activity, he is rapidly developing into a worthy successor to Chapman. Thompson at guard is a new man on the lineup but he has had experience in the game and is a good fighter.

The Milton team is a fast one and on its home floor will have a handicap on Pendleton, and it is not expected that the game therefore will be one-sided whatever way the victory goes.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
