TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 27th day of December, 1911, creating a special improvement district, the property hereinafter described as such district and the council proposes to assess the cost of the sewer to the extent of the cost of an eight inch sewer, the amount of each property owner's assessment being stated in said resolution, the council will ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such im-

provement, levy said assessment; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are the exterior lines of the property hereinafter described as benefited, viz:—

Blocks 115, 114, 113, 112, 111 and 110 of Chaplin's addition; Blocks 3, 4, and 5 of Coggan's addition; and tracts H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, R, S, T and U and block 12 of Coggan's second addition all in the city of La Grande, Union county, Oregon.

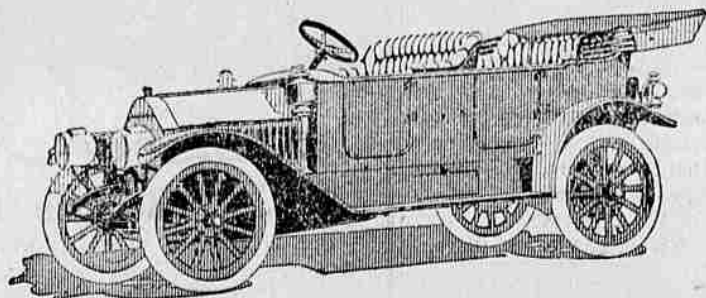
