MOTHER OF M. L. CARTER BURIED TODAY

Remains Brought Here From Auburn, Washington.

Martha E. Carter died at her home near Auburn, Washington, Jan. 5th, 1912, and was brought to La Grande and buried in the Ackles cemetery Jan. 9th. She was born in Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, April 2nd, 1828, and was the daughter of James and Esther Hanna. She was married to Daniel Carter in 1849, who died in 1865.
