### SHERIFF LOCATES GEORGE CROSBY

MAN WANTED IN WYOMING FOUND HERE WORKING ON A RANCH.

He Is Charged With Shooting His Employer at Kammerer.

Among the numerous descriptions of from information from the Wyoming

"men wanted" that come to the sheriff's office there recently was one from Sheriff Ward of Evanston, Wyoming, describing one George H. Crosby who is wanted there for shooting a man at Kammerer, Wyoming.

Sheriff Childers read the descriptions as they came to his desk and filed them. A few days ago he located Crosby out at Dick Peebler's ranch, where he had been working. The sheriff was certain of his man from the description and today sent a deputy out and placed the young man under arrest.

While details of the shooting are

officer that Crosby had been working not thoroughly known here it seems for a man at Kammerer, Wyoming and when he quit he asked for his pay. His employer informed the young man that he would have to fight if he ever got any money from him. Crosby left the man but returned later and again asked for his money, only to meet with the same reply and at the same time the employer drew a gun on the young man. Crosby was also armed and like a flash drew his gun and shot the man. Knowing that he was in trouble as soon as his employer fell to the ground Crosby left the state, hence the circulars from the sheriff's office. But the employer did not die and now Crosby will go back and stand trial and if information received here is correct it is doubtful if his punishment will be severe with a probability of complete acquittal.

Oregon Lumber Company as Transferee Is Defendant in Several.

David Eccles, millionaire lumberman, and the Oregon Lumber company figure in several of these cases already set. The government is plaintiff in each case. The patent is being held pending the hearing to settle the matter, and the Oregon Lumber company appears as defendant in the form of transferee in several of the cases. Attorney Lowell of Pendleton, C. H. Finn of La Grande, Attorney Rand and Gustave Anderson of Baker are some of the legal lights that will be defense counsel. Mr. Rand will act for Eccles. ### Old Superstitions.

Another custom, often noticeable in country parishes, is the reluctance to bury the dead on the north side of the churchyard. This is because evil spirits were always supposed to lurk on that side of the church precincts.—London Spectator.

### The Gentle Sex.

An eminent English statistician has calculated that of two children, a boy and a girl, born on the same day the boy will have only seventeen chances against eleven of living one year, while the girl will have twenty-one chances against eleven.
