REED COLLEGE BREAKS GROUND

SPLENDID STRUCTURE TO BE BUILT.

Ground Breaking Services to Be Held This Week.

Portland, Jan. 12.—(Special)—After five years of preparation, ground will be broken today for the first Reed college buildings on the campus of 80 acres in the city of Portland. The college will open next September in the permanent buildings, and on the endowment foundation of about \$3,000,000, provided by Mr. and Mrs. Simeon G. Reed of Portland.

The beginning is the culmination of a full year's work on the part of the president and the architects, Doyle Patterson and Beach. Every college in the United States and Canada, notable for its grounds and buildings, has been visited. The trustees are satisfied that in the group plan they have anticipated the growth of a century and embodied in the specific plans of the first buildings all the best ideas available anywhere. Last week the contract for the first two buildings was awarded to the Sound Construction company, and already the ground has been tested for the foundations.

At the breaking of ground this week, there will be a brief and simple ceremony, in the presence of trustees, faculty, students and friends. Dr. T. Lamb Elliot, president of the board of trustees, will preside. The Honorable Cyrus A. Dolph has been invited to deliver the commemorative address.

For the opening of the college next September, three principal buildings in addition to residences of the faculty, will be ready—the Arts building, the dormitory, and the gymnasium. All the buildings will be in the Collegiate-Gothic style of architecture. The

material will be Indiana limestone and mission brick. The Arts building and dormitory will be of steel and concrete structure, fire proof throughout. The buildings will run against the wooded ravine and lake, which are picturesque features of the campus. The Arts building is 257 feet long with wings 85 feet long. It has four stories. The estimated cost of the building and furnishings is \$225,000. The dormitory, which is virtually five separate dormitories, contains a large club room for men students, a dining hall, and rooms and baths for 125 students. The cost of this building, exclusive of furnishings, is \$140,000. There will be accommodations for women students, in charge of Dr. Eleanor Harris Rowland, who comes to Portland in September from Mount Holyoke college.

CIRCUS DRAMA CLEAN, TRUE

ed and bigoted church women and deacons to separate the girl and the young minister, the eager self sacrifice of the little circus rider when she realizes that the clergyman's career may be imperiled by her love and the final happy ending of the story after the stress, combine to make a play that has brought tears, laughter and sheer joy to hundreds of thousands of delighted theatre goers, and which undoubtedly will prove the best attraction seen here in many a day.

If you know anyone whose tendency is to pass by on the other side, anyone who is pessimistic or gloomy, anyone who has lost faith, in fact, anyone whose life is without sufficient sunshine, send that person to hear from the lips of "Polly" the old words: "Whither thou goest, I will go, for thy people shall be my people, and thy God, my God."

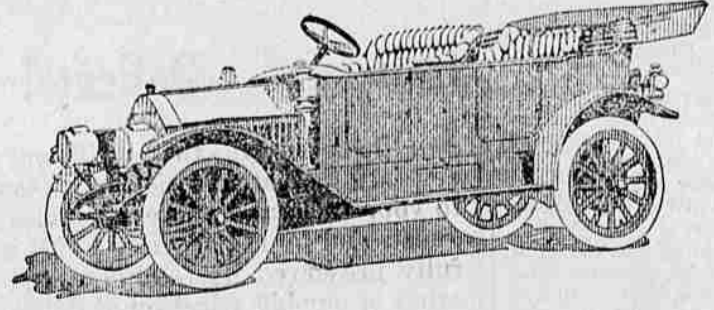
