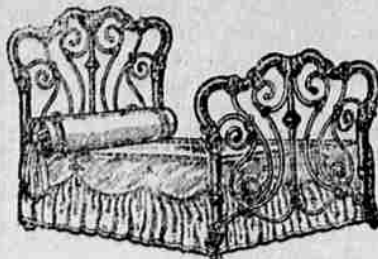

CLASSES WAR BREWERS TOPIC

THIRD SOCIALIST LECTURE TO BE GIVEN SOON.

Lycium Secretary Makes Third Announcement of Lecture Course.

George D. Brewer of Girard, Kansas, socialist lecturer and writer, will speak on the "War of the Classes" at the high school auditorium on January 15th at 8 p. m. That there is a class war in America would have been denied strongly by most people five years ago but the rapid extension of corporate power, the grabbing of vast lands in Alaska and other parts of our country simultaneously with the swallowing up of thousands of small enterprises in the industrial and business work and the bitter fought struggles between capital and labor have brought the average citizen to the point of admitting that there are at least tremendous opposing interests in America even though they may not be defined by class lines as distinct as those of Europe.

The socialists claim that their purpose in calling attention to the class struggle is not to accentuate its horrors such as strikes, lockouts and dynamite explosions but to give the general public a correct understanding of its position and its duty with relation to interests and events to the very purpose that those who are struggling for better conditions may employ education and legislation as opposed to violence or simple despair.

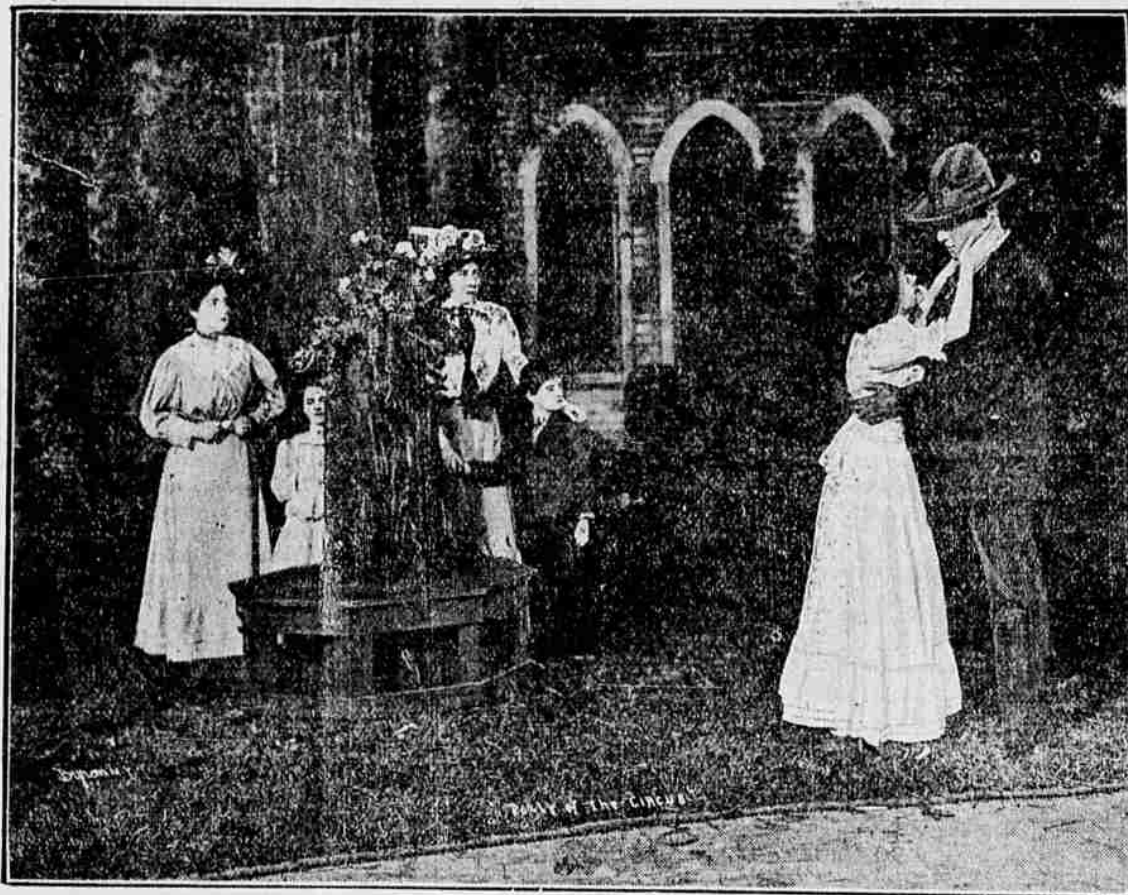
Believed in Closed Windows.

The white lock gave just the right touch. However fashion changed, he always wore the mustache and little imperial which other West Point men of his generation retained through life. Even his thick, bushy eyebrows were trained, and they added to the humorous or sardonic expression of the deep blue eyes from which many shrink.—Pennington's "Life of Whistler."

"Overhang" Houses.
 By the year 1670 wooden chimneys and log houses of the Plymouth and Bay colonies were replaced by more slightly houses of two stories, which were frequently built with the second story jutting out a foot or two over the first and sometimes with the attic story still further extending over the second story. This "overhang" is popularly supposed to have been built for the purpose of affording a convenient shooting place from which to repel the Indians. This is, however, an historic fable. The overhanging second story was a common form of building in England in the time of Queen Elizabeth, and the Massachusetts and Rhode Island settlers simply and naturally copied their old homes.
