EASTERN OREGON CLUB MEETS.

O. A. C. Students Hear Director of the Harney Experiment Station.

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 17.—Leroy Breithaupt, superintendent of the Harney County Agricultural Experiment station, spoke before the Eastern Oregon club on conditions in eastern Oregon, at the last meeting. Prof. J. B. Horner of the history department who was formerly a resident of Eastern Oregon, gave an interesting and amusing account of early life in that part of the state. The club made plans for a reception to be given with the aid of the college faculty to the students in the short course soon.

Same Forces Behind All Trusts

Washington, Jan. 17.—That the same forces which dominate the steel, the banking, the sugar and other trusts are in complete control of the harvester trust, was the assertion today of J. F. Lowe, representing the independent harvesting concerns, testifying before the house committee on rules. Lowe said he sought Roosevelt's support for his resolution to investigate the harvester trust but was put off and finally got indirect information by reading Roosevelt's editorial giving the steel trust a clean bill of health.

Conference of National Guardsmen.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 17.—Officers of the various regiments of the National Guard of New York assembled here today for the annual conference of their state association. The meeting, which will last two days, will consider a request to the War Department to minimize the changes in uniforms on the ground that frequent changes result in undue expense to the officers. The bill before congress providing for a small salary for members of the National Guard to meet incidental expenses will also be discussed.

MOTHER KILLS CHILD.

Nine Months of Crying Too Much for Her Nerves.

Toronto, Can., Jan. 17.—Her nerves shattered as the result of her nine months' old infant's continual crying, Mrs. Madge Gilbert, aged 25, deliberately sat on it, crushing it to death. Remorseful she confessed to the crime today and was arrested.

Oklahoma Retail Merchants.

Anadarko, Okla., Jan. 17.—A large attendance marked the opening here today of the annual convention of the Oklahoma association of retail merchants. The sessions will continue for two days, during which time the parcels post, the relations between the jobber and retailer, advertising methods, co-operative delivery and other subjects of interest and importance to the retail trade will be discussed.

Dr. Cleveland Abbe Honored.

London, Jan. 17.—The Royal Meteorological Society of London today formally presented the Symons gold medal to Dr. Cleveland Abbe, the meteorologist of the United States weather bureau at Baltimore. The medal was awarded to Dr. Abbe in recognition of his distinguished services as a meteorologist, in which field of science his activities have extended over a period of more than 40 years.

To Try Former Convict for Murder.

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 17.—The case of Charles Maust, who is alleged to be Ben Cravens, a notorious outlaw who terrorized Oklahoma some years ago, was called for trial today. While in the Missouri state prison last summer Maust was identified as Cravens and was brought here to stand trial for the murder of Assistant Postmaster Alvin Bateman at Red Rock in 1901.

Providence, R. I., Jan. 17.—St Stephen's church in this city was the scene of a brilliant wedding today, when Miss Primrose Colt, daughter of Judge and Mrs. LeBaron B. Colt, and niece of Col. Samuel P. Colt, became the bride of Reed Anthony of Boston. Bishop Perry officiated, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Flske, rector of St. Stephen's.
