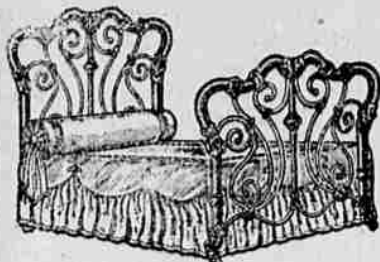

BUTTER PRICE GOES UPWARD

CHICAGO FEARS ENORMOUS PRICES SOON.

Quotations in East Already Reach Unusual Proportions.

Sixty cent butter is what Chicagoans faced this week when the retail price of Elgin, Ill., creamery butter—the staple of the market—reached 47 cents in many stores—the highest price in Chicago's history, dealers declared—and promised to go much higher soon. The wholesale price, 42 1/2 cents a pound, fixed by the Elgin butter board, broke all wholesale records for 21 years and commission men declared Tuesday that advances in the price which would place it high above the present point, seemed inevitable.

This addition to the high cost of living is blamed by some interested men to the scarcity of butter, while other persons ascribe it to an alleged trust which is already under investigation by federal authorities or to a corner by eastern houses.

ARMY HORSES IN DEMAND

PRESENT SUPPLY OF LIGHT ANIMALS SHORT.

War Now Would Bring Serious Handicap.

Chicago, Jan. 17.—A ludicrous lot of cab, dray and farm horses would be the only mounts for national guard and regular cavalrymen in case of war, judging from the scarcity of horses for the Chicago mounted police. Investigation has shown that the motley steeds hired for the annual I. N. G. encampments and maneuvers are the best that could be expected for real service, and consequently cavalrymen are alarmed. They attribute the scarcity of light horses to the heavy importation of draft stallions which has occurred during the last 50 years. During the civil war the officers experienced little or no difficulty in mounting their men but in these days of progress the prosperous farmer no longer keeps a fine team of carriage horses; he buys an automobile and confines his stable to heavy draft horses which can be used to a greater advantage on the farm. The mounted police of Chicago and New York ride some of the finest animals in the country but so hard are these to secure that they employ men to hunt the country over to find the few horses they require and pay as high as \$100 for a single animal. There are now said to be four blooded draft stallions to every blooded stallion of lighter build and in some western states the ratio is as high as eight to one. There are now approximately 27,000 horses in the regular army; an outbreak of hostilities would require twice that number and every four to six months would require a complete new issue of mounts. "At the present rate of breeding draft and light horses we would have to mount our men on heavy horses," said a cavalryman, "but an army cannot be mounted on drafters if it is to use its cavalry and field artillery to an advantage. All modern countries have found it necessary to encourage the breeding of light horses and America has at last followed its example by establishing breeding stations where a farmer can breed his mare free of charge and be assured a good price for the colt. The only obligation the farmer incurs is to allow the government an option of \$150 when it is three years old. The supply of light horses would gradually increase under this plan and if war should break out there would be

sufficient horses on hand to carry our army through a campaign as disastrous to horse flesh as the civil war, where each soldier used three mounts a year. It is hoped congress will provide a larger appropriation for these breeding stations this year.

SCHOOL FOLKS APPEALED TO

ALDERMAN WANTS CHILDREN TO ENTER CONTESTS.

Would Like to Have Oregon Outdo the Other States in This Respect.

To the Teachers of Oregon: Knowing that you are willing to co-operate in educational work I ask you to co-operate this year by encouraging all your pupils in the growing of crops, domestic science and poultry raising. Children like to do things and will respond to your encouragement. Your county will hold a fair at which your pupils will be asked to exhibit what they raise or make. The best of these exhibits will be brought to the state fair where liberal prizes will be awarded.

Ask your pupils how many of them would like to have a Shetland pony, a thoroughbred Jersey calf worth \$100, a pure bred pig that would take the prize at any stock show, a pure bred sheep with wool so thick that they would have to feel around to find its eyes, or a goat with flossy hair that reaches to the ground; or secure a fine Scotch Collie puppy that knows as much as some people, or win a money prize that will buy just what they want. All these prizes and many more are to be given at the state fair next fall.

Ask if they know how to grow potatoes, pumpkins, squashes, corn, pop corn, et cetera. Ask how many of them like watermelons or musk melons. The reason so many boys and girls in Oregon do not grow watermelons is because they are afraid the other boys will steal them. If they all grow water melons there will be no one to steal.

Ask them if they know how to feed chickens. If they buy three settings of eggs from one neighbor, and three hens from another, and in March put the two together they will probably raise some prize winners for the fair. The children of Oregon can double the egg production in three years.

Ask them if they know that the size of the pumpkin does not depend upon the size of the boy or the girl who plants the seed. I know a girl six

years old who raised corn 14 feet high. Let us show people that we are the most alive children in the world by 75,000 out of our 125,000 children exhibiting at the county fairs, and 35,000 at the state fair. Last year 14,000 children in Iowa had exhibits at fairs. Let us beat them two to one.
