**PLANNING O. A. C. SHOW.**

**Students Will Fly Airships and Do Brass Casting Stunts**

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 25.—(Special)—"Bigger, brighter and better" is the slogan of the engineering students of the Oregon Agricultural college in their plans for the annual engineering show to be held this year March 15-16. Hitherto the exhibit has been called an electrical show, and a manager, one of the electrical students, chosen to make the plans. This year it was decided to secure the co-operation of all of the engineering departments and make it an inclusive demonstration of what the college of engineering as a whole can do.

James B. Mann, a senior mechanical engineer from Portland, is the general manager, and F. O. McMillan, an electrical engineering senior from Salem who is business manager of the Student Engineer monthly magazine, is in charge of the business department of the show. Five assistant managers have been named to plan and prepare the exhibits of different engineering branches. Wilbur Andrews, a senior from Oregon City, is in charge of the mechanical engineering exhibits; A. F. Fachricht, a Portland senior, of the mining; H. S. Turley, '13, Astoria, of the forestry; W. G. Carson, '12, Irrigon, of the civil engineering; and Hugh I. Smith, '12, Marshfield, of the electrical engineering exhibits.

Many new features are to be introduced this year. The forestry department will exhibit for the first time, and Prof. George W. Peavy, head of the department, is greatly interested in the display which is being prepar-

ed. The civil and mechanical engineering departments, hitherto but minor exhibitors, will this year have the larger part of the space.

A blacksmithing shop will be in full operation by the mechanical engineers and a foundry, pattern making, and machine shop will interest visitors with the actual processes of making brass castings, and completing the burnishing processes, giving the visitors paper weights, monograms, and other souvenirs made "while they wait." The woodworking shop and power plant will also show interesting operations. A number of new pieces of equipment in the mechanical laboratories will be in full operation, and furnish spectacular features.

A. M. Jefferson of Baconia and J. F. Hess of Corvallis have purchased the Curtiss bi-planes exhibited at the last years show, and after many tests and the building of models and gliders, will be ready to give demonstrations of aviation.

The Architectural club, just formed this winter, is another new feature, as it, also, will have an exhibit, for which it is now holding a contest in which the members are competing for the honor of arranging the club exhibit. The highway construction department is making an effort to secure some of the miniature rock crushers used in the state fair good roads exhibit.

**MOOSE LODGE ACCUSED.**

**Spokane Members Sues Lodge for Being Called Insane.**

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Special)—Henry A. Francisco of Spokane, wants \$15,000 damages from the local lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose as balm for charging him with insanity. In an action filed in the Spokane county superior court yesterday he alleges that the visiting committee of the lodge of which he is a member, instituted a charge of insanity against him last August, following an illness of four weeks in June and July, 1911, and that he was discharged at a hearing after being examined by county and other experts. Francisco says in his complaint that the action of the lodge has injured his reputation and as a result he is unable to secure employment and is made the target of ridicule and abuse. Before he was stricken by sickness he was engaged as foreman of construction on several important works; but since then, he says, he has not been able to obtain work anywhere. The lodge will contest the damage suit.

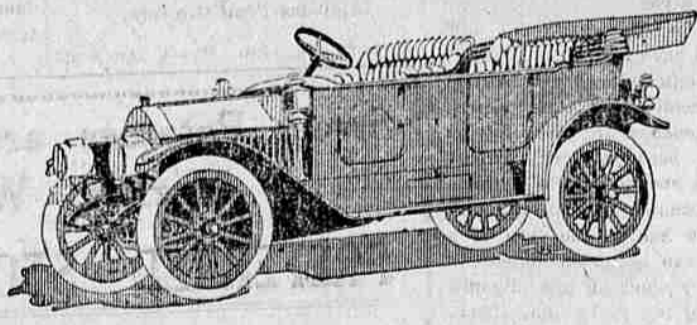
