WOUNDED MAN RELATES STORY

PRESS MONTGOMERY ISSUES FINAL STATEMENT IN CASE

Though Recovering Slowly Now, Expected to Die When Interviewed

A complete statement of the affair leading up to the shooting a few days ago of Press Montgomery, a former resident of La Grande, and who has relatives in South La Grande, is contained in a Lewiston paper of recent date. While Mr. Montgomery is recovering slowly and will probably prove victor in the crucial struggle with the wounds inflicted by Gidge Tippitts, according to late information from Lewiston, the appended statement of the case was made by Mr. Montgomery at a time when there appeared to be no escape from death. The Lewiston Tribune prints the following:

Full Details Told.

Lying on a cot in a ward on the third floor of St. Joseph hospital, surrounded by every comfort and aid a devoted wife and the sisters in charge can minister, Press Montgomery, who was shot by Gidge Tippitts on last Monday afternoon, and who was brought to this city on the launch Flyer late yesterday afternoon for medical treatment, was seen last night by a representative of the Tribune and told his version of the shooting and incidents which he claimed led up to it.

Montgomery stated that Monday's affair had its inception about three months ago. At that time, he said, he upbraided Tippitts at a place on Joseph creek, near the May ranch, for interfering in his domestic affairs and trying to break up his family. Tippitts leaving the scene without making any threats. The next time the men met was at Enterprise, Ore., on December 27 last, and no words were exchanged, and until last Monday the two involved in the shooting never crossed each other's path.

Montgomery stated that last Monday morning, while he and William Tope were standing talking, Tippitts, another man and three girls rode by at a fast clip, and as they passed, Montgomery said he yelled "Hello," and that one of the party responded to the greeting. At the time the party passed, Montgomery was a-foot searching for two horses straying from his camp, and after talking to Tope for a few minutes, proceeded to the ranch of Walter Day, where he found the animals in Day's pasture. He halted the horses and went to the lower ranch owned by May, where he secured 200 pounds of salt he had stored there. From there he proceeded to Day's place, stopping long enough to obtain a lash cinch to secure the salt to the back of one of his horses. After getting the cinch Montgomery claimed he started for the gate of the place, and while talking with a man named Joe Frazzell, Tippitts and a man named Reyburn, and wife were seen riding toward the spot.

Montgomery stated that to show that no real ill-feeling existed so far as he was concerned he again cried "Hello" four times, but never met with any response. When within talking distance Montgomery stated he said:

"I spoke to you," to which Tippitts replied: "Well, I didn't speak to you." Montgomery stated he said he thought Tippitts should leave the scene, to which he received a reply that "I don't intend to go."

After a few moments of parleying Montgomery reached for and secured a rock and the instant he arose with it in his hand he declared Tippitts pulled his gun, a six-shooter of the Smith & Wesson make, and after firing the first shot in the air, turned the barrel in the direction of Montgomery, and began a fusillade, the first shot striking him in the left breast and sending him to the ground.

With the firing of the shot, Montgomery claimed that Reyburn left his horse and stood alongside the frightened animal with a Winchester in his hand, not pointing the same in the direction of the prostrate man, but leaning it against his side as if for readiness in case of emergency. With the first two shots fired, Tippitts' horse stampeded, and after being turned back to the scene the rider again pointed his deadly gun in the way of the man on the ground and fired the four remaining shots in the chamber, three of which took effect, one entering the side and going through the body and striking the spinal column, paralyzing the man as he lay on the ground. The next shot struck the left buttock and penetrated through the small of the back; the next shot missed, and the final shot

struck Montgomery's left wrist, this happening just at a moment when he was pleading with those about him to bring him a gun of some description for self-protection.

At this time Walter Day stepped from among the horrified spectators and cried, "Don't shoot him any more." Then the frightened horse on which Tippitts was mounted swerved and started again to stampede, the rider turning and approaching the scene just as the fallen man was being carried into the home of Day; Frazzell, Day and Reyburn, who accompanied Tippitts, assisting in the work, Day telling him to get away from the place just as he was about to dismount from his horse.

Montgomery stated that so far as he knew the man doing the shooting had not indulged in liquor to bring about the action on his part, and also added that he himself had not partaken of a drink that day and that he was unarmed. After lying in Day's home for 18 hours without medical attendance of any kind, except what aid could be given him by the people at the ranch, a physician, Dr. McElvaine, arrived from Anatone, a distance of about 20 miles, and after doing everything within his power to prolong the man's life, ordered him shipped to this city.

Montgomery is attended by Dr. F. P. Nourse. He is paralyzed below the hips and his condition is critical.

Notes from the Labor World.

The annual convention of the Georgia State Federation of Labor will be held at Waycross, April 25.

New York State Federation of Labor's executive committee has endorsed a proposed legislative measure providing for industrial insurance in that state.

The San Francisco Labor Temple association has asked the labor council to request affiliated unions to buy stock in order to create a building fund of \$45,000 to start the new building.

Fatalities in coal mines over the country average well above two thousand from year to year and are double the number of a decade ago. The employment continues far more deadly than railroading.

The Portland, Ore., city council has authorized Mayor Rushlight to appoint a committee of business men to conduct a series of co-operative shops, where the profits would be distributed among the shareholders—the public.

On Prussian State railroads the predominant working hours are eight to nine and nine to ten. More than half the locomotive men and plate layers work less than nine hours, but 54 per cent of pointmen and signalmen are on for ten to twelve.

At the primary election parties will nominate for same offices and in addition will express their choice for president and vice president and will elect delegates to their national conventions.
