LA GRANDE REAL ESTATE SELLING IN PORTLAND

The "La Grande Development company" with offices in the Chamber of Commerce building at Portland is a new company formed by George F. Scollard for the sale of La Grande real estate and from the reports of record it would seem that business had started with a rush. A dozen salesmen and salesladies are at work selling La Grande property in the city of Portland to people, who after this city's resources have been explained, have little hesitancy in making investments there.

The new company has taken over Connordale including the entire possessions of Dr. O'Connor in La Grande besides some other properties. The terms are easy upon which the real estate is being sold and the lots are selling readily.

At this end of the line the Gliven Investment company retains local control and will in a few days open a campaign at home for further sale of this property. It is predicted at the offices in Portland that the entire

SEWER DITCH PROBLEM BIG

DANGEROUS CONDITIONS IN ALLEYS UNAVOIDABLE.

Existing Condition Hard to Remedy Until Frost Is Gone. Until enough dirt is available to fill the sunken sewer ditches throughout the sewer districts of the city, extreme care will be a necessary detail of driving, automobile and team. Alleys, and, in some instances, streets, are in a dangerous condition through dangers from half-filled ditches. Wherever a sewer has been laid this winter or last fall, the fill-in has depressed more or less and cannot be properly refilled until the weather moderates and frost leaves the ground. In some of the alleys this condition is serious and extreme precautions should be used by every driver having occasion to enter an alley. Thin coatings of ice often deceive the driver, shielding conditions that are dangerous. All the street department or the contractors can do right now, it is said, is to place obstructions at the deepest ditches and await further thaw. A little precaution on the part of drivers of teams for the next few days will avert accidents.

CHINESE GIVE LIGHT TO NAME

CHO SIN KNOWN IN LA GRANDE IS ANOTHER MAN.

Conflict in Names of Yesterday Is Explained by Toy Young.

Further investigation today divulges that Cho Sin, referred to in yesterday's Observer articles as possibly being the Chinaman wanted in Portland in connection with the murder of a Chinaman, Seld Bing, there in December, is now in Baker and for many years ran a truck farm, near La Grande, but so far as can be determined, never lived in Pendleton. His cousin, Cho Parks, is also at Baker and it was Parks that was in La Grande Wednesday and who returned to Baker (not Weiser) yesterday morning. Toy Young and other well known Chinamen today vouched for the excellent character of Cho Sin, and explains the departure of Parks yesterday morning. It seems that Parks came to La Grande from Boise to clear up the estate of a cousin who had died at Boise and he went home yesterday morning, after completing his business affairs. Just how the Chinese yesterday afternoon came to assert so vehemently that Cho Sin was in La Grande the day before, is not explained, but Toy Young gives his word that it was Parks, not Cho Sin. How it comes about that a Cho Sin is wanted in Portland is not known for Toy Young who has been in Portland considerably, knows no one in that city by such a name. On the other hand, however, he affirms that the La Grande Cho Sin has been in Baker since leaving La Grande some time ago. Local Chinese are greatly interested in the hunt for murderer of Seld Bing.
