

WOMEN PARADE IN ZERO CLIMES

LAWRENCE SEES DEMONSTRATION BY UNEMPLOYED

MOTORMAN RUNS CAR INTO THE MARCHING LINE; RIOT

Children and Women of Striking Textile Workers Lead Parade at Lawrence Today—Operators Will Not Arbitrate—Official O. K. Put on the Laundry Workers' Strike at New York Today.

Lawrence, Mass., Jan. 29.—Placing women and children at the head and flying the American flag, 15,000 strikers singing the Marseillaise, paraded the streets in zero weather today. They are protesting against the operators of the textile mills who refused to arbitrate.

A riot occurred in which sixteen trolley cars were smashed, when a trouble seeking motorman forced his car through the line, injuring several. Seven of the strikers were arrested.

STATE SANCTIONS STRIKE.

New York Department Finds Laundry Workers Are Just in Demands.

New York, Jan. 29.—The official O. K. of the state labor department was today put on the laundry workers' strike. The department made an investigation and said that the workers' complaints are justified. They say the sanitary conditions are horrible, the wages too small and the hours too long.

UNEMPLOYED ARRESTED

Police Whip Crowds With Quirts when They Congregate.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 29.—Twenty-four are in court today as the result of a miniature riot yesterday when the police with quirts broke up a street meeting after warning the crowd to disperse.

Union men are no talking of a general strike unless the right of free speech at some appointed public place is allowed. The meeting was held after six o'clock and the unemployed marched through the streets.

Curtiss Wins Trophy.

Los Angeles, Jan. 29.—Glenn Curtiss received a telegram from the Aero club of America today, informing him that he had been awarded the club's annual trophy for the greatest advance in aviation during the year of 1911. Curtiss' hydroplane is believed to have secured him the honor.

IMMEDIATE EXPLANATION ASKED BY JOHN BULL.

Boat Taken Captive by Italians and Trouble Is Brewing.

London, Jan. 29.—Serious trouble between Italy and England today became a possibility as the result of the Italian Red Sea flotilla seizing a British launch near Hobeida off the Arabian coast. Notifying the government of the seizure the British consul said it was unwarranted. He urged that a cruiser be dispatched immediately, saying the Italians have threatened to bombard the town.

TAFT DEFENDS SELF IN OHIO

Cairo Dispatches Say Relative of King George Succumbs.

Toronto, Jan. 29.—A cablegram says the Duke of Fife, a brother-in-law of King George V, has died in Egypt. He had been suffering with lung congestion and contracted a cold when the steamer Delhi was stranded last December. He was en route to Cairo, where it is reported he died. His wife, Princess Royal, and two daughters, were with him.

BULLETS HUSH MOORE SCANDAL

MILLIONAIRE IS KILLED BY CHAUFFEUR IN FIGHT

AUTO DRIVER MAY ESCAPE PROSECUTION TOO

Chauffeur Driving With Mrs. Moore, Central Figure in Recent Scandal Alfred in Divorce Court, Returns Fire Commenced by Moore—One Bullet Slays the Millionaire.

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—District Attorney Swart of San Mateo county said today he thought the case against Chauffeur Samuel Timothy who shot Millionaire John Moore, Saturday night, wont be prosecuted. Moore died of a wound sustained when he shot at Timothy in an automobile with his wife, whom he recently vainly sued for a divorce. Moore admitted he shot first. Pictures of Mrs. Moore were found on Chauffeur Timothy who was charged with murder.

Moore died at Red Cross hospital at death the old scandal which came out in a recent divorce suit, instituted by both is hushed. Mrs. Moore is one of California's society leaders and charged him with cruelties. He charged her with illicit relations with prominent men, even her own servants. In the ante mortem statement Moore said he was waiting for his wife when the Chauffeur's car stopped in the middle of the road and Mrs. Moore got out of the machine. The he fired at Timothy but missed. The Chauffeur returned the fire and struck him once.



SHELBY M. CULLOM, FATHER OF THE U. S. SENATE.

THE oldest United States senator in point of service is Shelby M. Cullom, senior representative of Illinois in the upper house of congress. He is second in point of age only to Senator Stephenson of Wisconsin, who was born on June 18, 1820, a little more than five months before Mr. Cullom, whose birthday is Nov. 22. The senator whose length of service most nearly approaches his is Gallinger of New Hampshire, who has been in the senate continuously for twenty-one years as against Cullom's twenty-nine. In his reminiscences, recently published, he reviews with great frankness his relations with the statesmen of his time, including Lincoln, Johnson, Grant, Blaine, Garfield, Harrison and John Sherman. President Taft said of him a little while ago: "He comes nearer connecting the present with the days of Washington than any one whom I know." He is chairman of the foreign relations committee. His term will expire March 3, 1913.

PROTESTING, WOLTER DIES

CLAIMS INNOCENCE AS HE TAKES CHAIR AT SING SING

CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE MAKES HIM A VICTIM, HE SAYS

Penalty for Murder of Stenographer Two Years Ago Paid by Wolter Today—Attending Physician Believes Him Guilty But That He Acted His Innocence to the End.

Sing Sing, New York, Jan. 29.—Cool, and protesting his innocence to the very last, Albert Wolter was electrocuted today for the murder of Ruth Wheeler. The murder was committed a little over two years ago and created considerable excitement at the time on account of the fiendish manner in which her body had been mutilated. The body of the murdered woman was found in the room of Wolter and it was proven at the trial that Wolter had inserted an advertisement for a stenographer, which had been answered by the victim. In a note which the condemned man left, he claimed that he had been the victim of circumstantial evidence.

As he was taken from the death chamber Wolters turned to eighteen other condemned murderers and said: "Good bye, boys, it will soon be over now."

He went to the chair in a jaunty, self possessed manner and maintained his nerve until the very last. Three minutes after the current had been turned on he was pronounced dead. Dr. Lane, the execution witness, said Wolters' manner indicated that he was

undoubtedly guilty and was trying to convince others of his innocence by an assumed show of bravado.

OI SEN ARRESTED.

Chinese Woman Found at Billing, Montana—Will Be Returned.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 29.—Following information of the arrest of OI Sen, a Chinese woman suspected of the murder of Seld Bing, a Portland Chinese, the trunk victim, at Billings, Montana, Detective Day will take out requisition papers and leave tonight for Billings. The woman will be tried on a charge of first degree murder here.

MRS. MORROW SURRENDERS.

Says She Is Innocent and Wants an Immediate Hearing.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—Mrs. Rene Morrow who disappeared after she had been indicted for the murder of her aged inventor-husband, surrendered today by her attorney and was jailed. "I am innocent; why should I spend my time in jail?" she asked the court when she applied for a hearing this afternoon.

DAVIS DENIES HILTON CHARGE

SAYS McNAMARA WASN'T FRIGHTENED INTO CONFESSION.

Attorney of Confessed Dynamiter Disputes Coercion in Case.

Los Angeles, Jan. 29.—"John knew what he was doing when he pleaded guilty. He took his medicine and is satisfied," commented Lecompte Davis associate counsel for the McNamaras, when shown Judge Hilton's statement made in Denver that he believed John McNamara was innocent and that he (McNamara) would soon prove it. Hilton told the Denver trades council that John confessed through fear.

INDICTMENTS ARE EXPECTED.

Lecompte Davis Testifies Before the Grand Jury This Afternoon.

Los Angeles, Jan. 29.—Lecompte Davis, formerly associate counsel for the McNamara defense, was called before the county grand jury investigating the outgrowths of the McNamara trial here today. He was preceded by I. C. James, one of the McNamara venturers.

Following the examination of Davis it was announced that the county grand jury would report late today. There is an air of expectancy and it is hinted that indictments may be returned.

MONEY TRUST PROBE SURE.

Committee Will Report Favorably on the Investigation Soon.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Members of the house committee on rules today declared resolutions for a probe of the "money trust," the substitute for Lindbergh's resolution, will be favorably reported. It is charged that the money trust by controlling the finances, throttles financial enterprise that compete with other business financier's interests.

GABY DESLYS NOT MARRIED.

DR. SEEMANN TO TAKE CHARGE

WILL TAKE UP WORK IN PORTLAND IN A FEW WEEKS

LEAD LOCAL OPTION FORCES DURING THE LAST CAMPAIGN

After Approximately Five Years Spent in La Grande, Presbyterian Pastor Will Move to Portland—Resignation Surprise to his Congregation Tendered Yesterday.

Rev. W. S. Seemann D. D., yesterday tendered his resignation as pastor of the First Presbyterian church in this city, dealing a shocking surprise to his congregation. Few of the church anticipated the resignation and the epistle came as a complete surprise to the great majority of his church followers. Dr. Seemann goes to Hope Presbyterian church at Portland, a church ranking high in the point of numbers and prestige in the metropolis.

The resignation becomes effective on February 21 and in the meantime the church government will go into the market as it were for a successor to Dr. Seemann.

Receiving a call from the Hope church at Portland Dr. Seemann deliberated long and earnestly being loth to leave his field here where in five years' occupancy of the Presbyterian pulpit he has cemented himself closely with the church people and has been a warm friend of the public at large. Dr. and Mrs. Seemann came here from Union where they were located for a year.

Led Option Forces.

During the last local option campaign Dr. Seemann was the backbone of the generalship of the struggle conducted by the local option forces in this county. His pen and personal work played an important part in it.

New Field Promised

The departing pastor's new field is of course larger than the one he has so successfully filled here. The church is one of the prominent religious organizations and Dr. Seemann left last night for San Francisco where he has business needing attention and on his return will prepare to move to Portland.

WILL AVENGE LYNCHING.

Equador Teems With Revolutionary Fever Following Crime.

Quito, Equador, Jan. 29.—To avenge the deaths of five generals, revolutionary leaders—Elry Alfaro, Flavio Alfaro, Medaro Alfaro, Paez and Manuel Serrano—lynched by a mob who took them from the jail, friends are fomenting another revolution, claiming the government is responsible.

Will Divide Profits.

HORSE THIEF UNDER CLOUDS

PRINEVILLE MAN MAY HAVE BEEN MURDERED.

Pending Investigation, Horse Rustler Will Be Held.

Burns, Ore., Jan. 29.—Charged with horse stealing, Douglas Tapp was arrested here today and will be held pending an investigation into the disappearance recently of his employer, Frank Way, who owns a ranch near Prineville and who disappeared shortly after he had withdrawn a sum of money from the bank. Tapp tells conflicting stories explaining Way's absence.
