VAGARIES OF THE TIDE.

Mysterious Currents, the Secrets of Which No One Has Solved.

There are as many vagaries in the waters as in the winds. Why, for instance, should great ocean currents send their warm waters across the wide Pacific and Atlantic? Other and equally mysterious currents exist in well nigh all parts of the world.

It is on record that the sea has run for weeks out of the Java sea, through the strait of Sunda and thence back again for a like period without any perceptible rise and fall during those times.

Then there is the equatorial current that flows into the Caribbean sea, the ever flowing current to the eastward around Cape Horn, the cold stream flowing from the icy regions of the north past Newfoundland and Nova Scotia and along the American coast to the extreme end of Florida, the continual current running with a velocity of from four to five knots an hour through the strait of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean sea, the swift current running across the rocks and shoals off the end of Billiton Island, which apparently starts from nowhere and ends somewhere in the vicinity of the same place, and the current which, starting halfway up the China sea, runs from two to three knots an hour to the northeast and finally ends abruptly off the north end of Luzon.

Then we have those tidal vagaries known the world over as bores. Those that run up the Hugel and Iravadi rivers, from side to side, till they reach their limit, often tearing the ships from their anchorage, originate nobody knows where or why.

At Singapore it has been observed for days at a time that there has been but one rise and fall in the twenty-four hours.—Boston Globe.

NAPOLEON'S DESTINY.

Summed Up in Four Mottoes Bonaparte Learned at School.

In 1784 Bonaparte, then fifteen years old, arrived at the military school of Paris from Brienne, being one of four under the conduct of a minor priest. He mounted 173 steps, carrying his small valise, and reached, in the attic, the barrack chamber he was to occupy. This chamber had two beds and a small window opening on the great yard of the school. The young predecessors of Bonaparte had bespattered the whitewashed walls with charcoal, and the newcomer could read in this little cell these four inscriptions, which we ourselves read these years ago:

An epaulet is very long to win.—De Montigny.

The finest day in life is that of a battle.—Vicomte de Tintencie.

Life is but a prolonged lie.—Le Chevallier Adolphe Delmas.

The end of all is six feet of earth.—Le Comte de la Villette.

With the trifling substitution of the word "empire" for "epaulet" these four sentences contain the whole destiny of Bonaparte and formed a kind of "Mene, Tekel, Upharsin," written in advance upon that wall.—Victor Hugo.

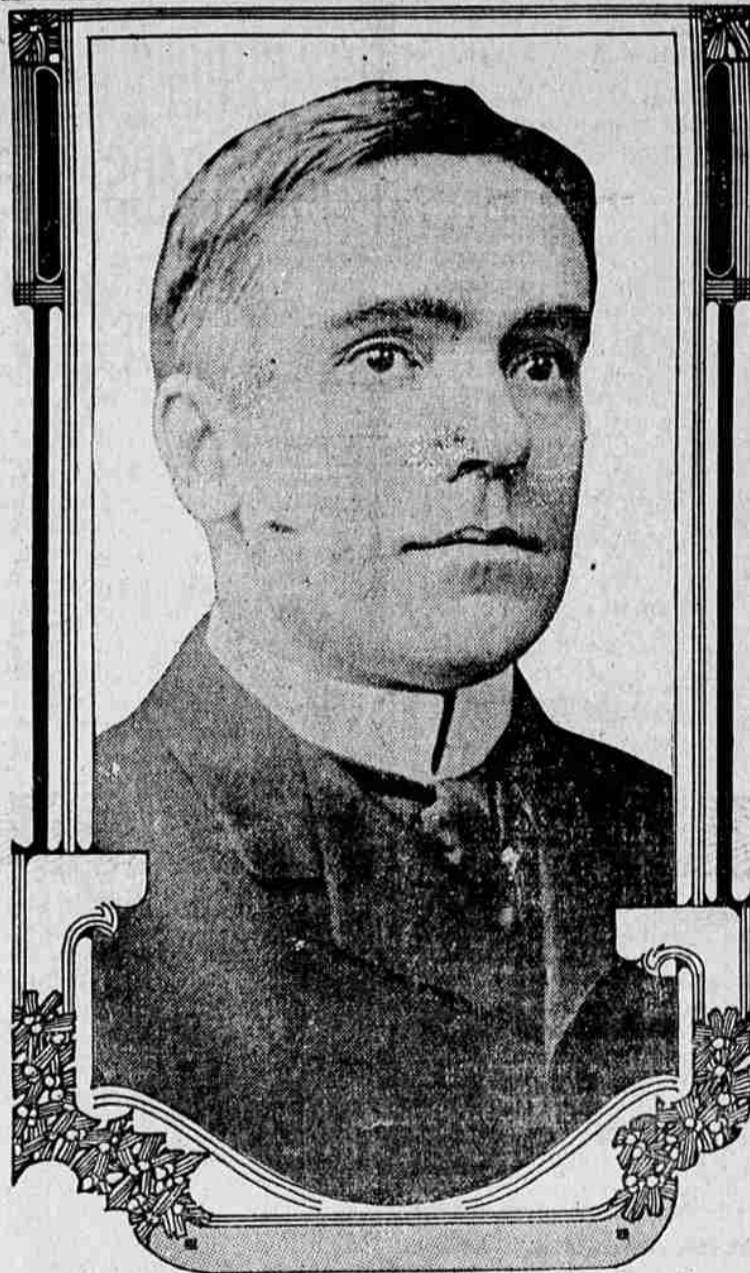

FRANCIS J. SWAYZE, SUPREME COURT JUSTICE.

F FRANCIS J. SWAYZE, mentioned as a possible supreme court justice to succeed the late Justice Harlan, is regarded as the first jurist of New Jersey. He is a Republican and sixty years old—a young man as age is reckoned in the supreme court. He was presiding judge in the prosecution by the state of New Jersey of the meat packing companies, sitting in the United States circuit court. His decision prevented the exhibition in the state of the moving picture films of the Johnson-Jeffries fight. He held that they "pandered to the vicious and disorderly elements of society."
