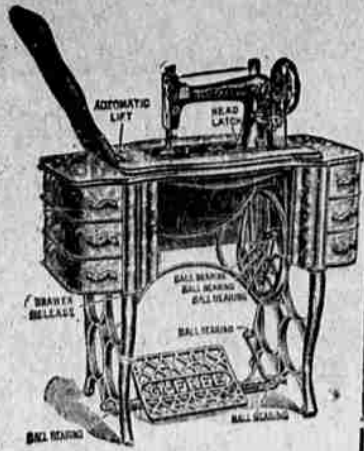


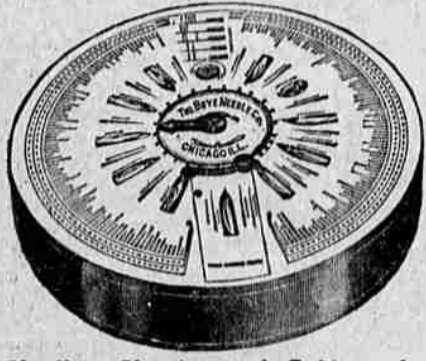

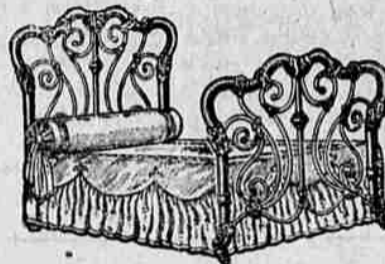

Telephone and Personal Requests Must Now Take Chances.

Late this afternoon the demands for additional plates has been so incessant that the Commercial club directors are considering a deal to change the dining room quarters in a way that will accommodate all who come. Definite announcement will be made tomorrow and plate can then be reserved with the committee, should the larger facilities be secured.

thyst, a topaz and a ruby. The pallium is made of the wool of two white lambs offered at the feast of St. Agnes the virgin and martyr. It is woven by the nuns of the convent of Terre di Spechli.

The Most Rev. Edmund F. Prendergast, the new archbishop of Philadelphia, was born in Ireland 69 years ago. He came to America in 1859, and six years later, in the very cathedral where he today was invested with the pallium, he was ordained a priest. He served in various charges in eastern Pennsylvania and in 1874 he was made

rector of St. Malachy's church, in this city, of which he is still nominally the rector. Fourteen years ago he was made auxiliary bishop of Philadelphia and 11 years ago Archbishop Ryan appointed him administrator of the archdiocese, to take effect at the death of the archbishop.

### OLD SUBJECT WELL HANDLED

Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, state president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and one of the prominent temperance lecturers of the country, gave a very strong address interspersed with fine turns of humor, at the union services in the Methodist church last Sunday evening. She surprised and at first may have disappointed her good sized audience by announcing as her subject, the somewhat hackneyed one of "Woman's Suffrage." But under her skillful and often humorous handling and her masterful array of fresh facts and arguments, her lecture proved to be fresh, up-to-date and convincing.

Among the many strong utterances, she said: "Complaint is made that in states where the women vote, some grave evils still exist. You men have been running things for three thousand years or more, and by your voting have gotten things in a pretty mess, and now you blame us women for not pulling you out of the mud within two or three years. I read in my Bible that woman was made from the first man's rib. If one rib does so badly as you say we do, what will the whole man do to our 'social order?' They say, that the women sometimes make mistakes, therefore they ought not to be given the ballot. Well, have you men never made any mistakes? By that argument I can prove to you that the men ought to be all disfranchised, while the women vote, for the men have made a great many awful mistakes. Yes, we do sometimes make mistakes. But I want to be responsible for my own mistakes and not be held responsible for the mistakes of my husband and brothers. If I make a mistake at one election, I may at a later time, be able to correct it. But if someone else makes a mistake for me, I may never

be able to correct it, for he may not be willing to do so."

She went on to point out, from recent events, in equal suffrage states, especially in Seattle, Wash., that the women's vote had already corrected a great many morally evil conditions, and made their communities far better places in which to live and rear children. She charged to men's one-sided, commercial way of handling our affairs, conditions which cause child labor and place overpowering temptations in the way of young working girls, to induce them to sell their virtue for bread and clothes.

"We have gotten away from God's plan. I read in the fore part of my Bible: 'In the beginning He created them male and female and called their name Adam.' (man or human being.) You cannot tell which one was the Adam. God meant that they should work together to build up a true all

round social order. Men, because of their duty as providers for the home, naturally place more emphasis upon material values. Women, because of their position as mother and nurse in the home, are naturally quicker to perceive moral values and interests. Their first thought is for the protection of the morals and comfort of their young and of the mothers of the race. It has been found that out of every hundred bills passed by men, in nation and states, only one gets through, which stands purely for a moral issue and has no commercial value. Where the women vote, this is quickly changed, and a fair number of bills are passed for the protection of our women, our cities, our homes and our sons and daughters.
