MUTINY FATAL TO AMERICANS

LEADERS WILL BE SHOT WHEN REVOLT ENDS.

Garrison Across River From El Paso Has Stirring Times.

El Paso, Feb. 1.—Fifteen persons, including two Americans, are dead as the result of a mutiny in a Mexican garrison at Juarez last night which started when Chihuahua papers arrived, saying General Orozco, one of the most conspicuous figures in the revolution, had resigned because 100 men in the Juarez garrison were discharged.

The fourth United States cavalry is guarding the border and refugees are arriving to El Paso. Several buildings were wrecked when the mutineers and loyal troops fought throughout the town.

Death Awaits Leaders.
Mexico City, Feb. 1.—The war office is active as a result of the Juarez mutiny. It is understood that when the government retakes Juarez the entire garrison will be court-martialed, and the ringleaders shot.
Juarez is just across the river from El Paso, Texas.

Seeking the South Pole With Aid of Dogs and Motor Sled

NOW that Peary has planted the American flag on the "top of the world," interest in polar exploration centers about the antarctic, where the British expedition under Captain Robert F. Scott, which started from New Zealand in November, 1910, has probably by this time succeeded in its dash for the south pole or has given up the attempt for this season. It was the hope of the leader that he and his party would spend Christmas at the pole, for he thought his best chance of reaching it would be about Dec. 22, when the sun was highest in the southern hemisphere. For land transport the members of the party depended upon the dogs (which are shown in our illustration as they appeared on the Terra Nova, in which the explorers sailed), and, in case the dogs should die or have to be killed for food, upon the motorsled which is shown in the upper picture.

The resolution declared that third terms are unwise, unpatriotic and contrary to republican principles.

SALE OF LOCAL REAL ESTATE IN OTHER CITIES IS BIG

Connordale Tracts to Be Handled by Development Company Men.
