**PLAN PENSION
FOR RANGERS**

Washington, Feb. 5.—(Special) —
Forest service men who are blinded
or otherwise disabled and the depend-
ents of men killed in fighting forest
fires can expect no compensation from
the government. To remedy this con-
dition Senator Dixon (republican, of
Montana), is making a sturdy effort to
have the forest service employees in-
cluded in the law which awards com-
pensation to victims of hazardous gov-
ernment employment. The law, which
proposes amendments in behalf of the
employees of the bureau of mines and
the forest service, is pending in the
senate.

Speaking of the widespread fires of
1910, Senator Dixon said: "I was in
the very center of the great forest
fires of the northwest during that
period, and there were over 75 men
burned to death in a radius of 150
miles of the place where Senator Hey-
burn and myself reside. In the forest
ranger service during those fires, as I
recall it, six or seven of the forest

rangers in the discharge of their duty
fighting fierce forest fires were burn-
ed to death. I know individually of
three or four cases where the eyesight
of those men were destroyed and they
are blind for life.

"I remember in particular an old
man who lives at the southern end of
bitter Root valley, who three years
ago in the forest fires had his eyes
completely burned out. His compan-
ions rescued him and he is living
there on the charity of his neighbors
in the county.

"When those great crises occur and
men take their lives in their hands and
go into the mountains fighting fire,
certainly this government should not
refuse them the slight pittance of six
months' pay for disability or one
year's pay in case of death."

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE
COMING WEEK.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 3.—Presi-
dent Taft will be one of the speakers
at the annual dinner of the League of
Republican State Clubs at the New
Willard hotel Saturday night. The
other speakers will be Charles D.
Hilles, secretary to the president; C.
W. Fairbanks of Indiana, Governor
Hadley of Missouri, Governor Golds-
borough of Maryland, Job Hedges of
New York, John Hays Hammond of
Massachusetts, D. D. Woodmansee of
Ohio and J. Hampton Moore of Penn-
sylvania.

A joint caucus of republican sena-
tors and representatives will be held
Monday to ratify selections of mem-
bers of the republican congressional
campaign committee. The caucus is
preliminary to the organization of the
congressional committee for the com-
ing campaign.

The first state convention to select
delegates to the republican national
convention will be that of Florida,
which will assemble Tuesday at Pa-
latka. There appears to be no oppo-
sition to President Taft in Florida,
and he is expected to have the solid
delegation.

The trial of the government's crim-
inal case against the members of the
so called bathtub trust, who have
been under indictment since 1910, is
scheduled to begin Tuesday in the
federal court at Detroit.

The universal regard in which the
memory of Charles Dickens is held
will be given eloquent expression
throughout the English speaking
world on Wednesday, which will be
the 100th anniversary of the birth of
the great novelist.

first treaty of alliance between France
and the United States in 1778 by Ben-

Cook Accused of Killing Captain.
Boston, Mass., Feb. 5.—William De-
Graff, a hunchback, was placed on
trial for his life in the United States
district court here today charged with
the murder of Captain Charles H. Wy-
man of the coal barge Glendower, on
which De Graff was the cook. The
murder of Captain Wyman, which oc-
curred while the barge was on its way
from Philadelphia to Boston, was one
of the most heartless crimes commit-
ted for many years within the juris-
diction of the local federal court. The
head of the skipper was crushed by
a blow from some heavy instrument,
which was, it is believed, thrown into
the sea after the murder.

Plan Fight on Blight.
Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 5.—In pursu-
ance of a call issued by Governor Ten-
ner an interstate conference is to meet
this week to devise ways and
means of checking the chestnut blight,
which is destroying millions of dol-
lars worth of valuable timber. The
blight already has spread over a large
part of eastern Pennsylvania and it is
feared that it will soon make its way
into neighboring states unless it is
stopped.

Marine Corps Officer on Trial.
Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 5.—A court
martial with Col. George Barnett pre-
siding convened at the Philadelphia
navy yard today for the trial of Lieut.
C. W. Alger of the marine corps. Lieut.
Alger is charged with conduct unbecom-
ing an officer.
