MARY CHILDERS UNDER KNIFE

CONVERSES DURING OPERATION,
FEELS NO PAIN.

Former Island City Lady Is Recovering From Long Illness.

Writing from Harrisburg, Ore., under date of Feb. 2, Mrs. Florence Irwin of Island City, tells of the unusual operation performed on Mrs. Mary E. Childers, formerly of Island City. Mrs. Irwin was present at the time and the many friends of Mrs. Childers will read the following with interest:

"Mrs. Childers has been in very poor health for some 24 or 25 years and after being in Harrisburg the greater part of the winter became seriously ill. She was taken to the hospital on Monday, Jan. 22, and was operated upon Wednesday, Jan. 24, for removal of the appendix and also a tumorous growth. The tumor contained as near as can be estimated three gallons or 24 pounds. The operation was exceedingly unusual, owing to complications and while she is getting along nicely, and high hopes are entertained for her recovery it was with a feeling that only a meager chance remained when the step was taken.

"In this instance a spinal anesthesia was used, the first attempt by Dr. Dale in his hospital, or by any surgeon in the upper valley. The action is peculiar in that she remained awake, able to converse with those about her with no sensation of pain. She relished a cup of coffee before the operation was complete.

"Mrs. A. J. Colt of Summerville, Eastern Oregon, came some time after the operation was ended.

"Mrs. Childers is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. She has a nurse and a good doctor and the very best of care in general."
