sioner, justices of the peace and

constables, recorder, superinten-

dent of schools, dairy and food

commissioner, railroad commis-

sioner (2nd district) state repre-

sentative, Union and Wallows coun-

ties senator from Union and Wal-

lows counties, representative

from Union County, joint senator

including Union, Malheur and

Morrow counties.

At the primary election par-

ties will nominate for same of-

fices and in addition will ex-

press their choice for president

and vice president and will elect

delegates to their national con-

ventions.

Registration closes on April 2.

Last day for candidates to file

nominating petitions, April 4.

Registration reopens April 29.

Closes for last time May 15.

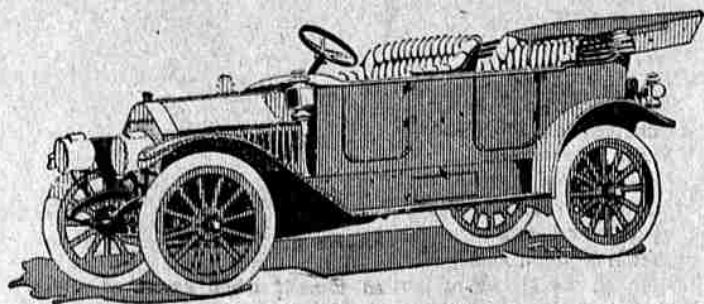
