manches. The committee will probably take up some systematic scheme to have people follow the cement and not cut cross lots. Another pre-eminent motive before the city beautiful

movement is to get the streets and alleys cleaned up. Spring is approaching and the annual effort of the city officials along this line will be abetted by circumspect help from the city beautiful committee which will first try to educate the public along this line and then by personal work hunt out and remedy any glaring violations of sanitary-purposed ordinances. Assistance in getting uniform tree lines, beautifying of front and back yards and a general campaign towards making La Grande a more beautiful community. The field is so large and so important that it will need systematized campaigns to accomplish the best good and until the committee outlines its plans, co-operation from the public will be stimulated. There is every reason to believe that the personnel of the committee in charge will exert its every energy toward the goal aimed at, and within a few days the populace will be informed along which particular lines the beautifying will take its first course.

Child Welfare Commenced.

Another important committee appointed yesterday was that of the child welfare. The general aim of this movement is to go out to the helpless and help. In a city of La Grande's size there is probably but little child labor in vogue, and if any there be, it will be the aim of this committee to find and relieve such conditions. Children of parents too poor to properly attend to needed surgical attention, such as adenoids, defective eyesight, and cripples where minor operations would remedy the faults, will be located in school and out and through financial assistance of the club, oversee that such needed attention is given. To go into the schools and study with the teacher the best methods of ventilation and attend to sanitary conditions in conjunction with the school management, is another aim of the Child Welfare movement. This committee has Mrs. E. E. Bragg at its head and it, too, will soon have a well defined campaign to carry out.

Mrs. Schilke, chairman of the city beautiful movement, said today that there are so many things to be done that the committee would first meet and outline its plan, but, "nothing that we can do will help the city unless the citizens and business men lend their aid," she affirmed.
