KUHN AGENT VISITS OREGON

BELIEVED VISIT TO BAKER IS SIGNIFICANT.

Pittsburgher Refuses to Admit Nature of His Visit.

(Baker Herald.)
Major Fred R. Reed, the western business representative of the Kuhn

Brothers of Pittsburg, was in the city yesterday looking over the city and studying conditions. It was the Kuhn brothers that supplied the money for developing the famous Twin Falls tract in southern Idaho and no man did more to assist in developing that section and establishing new towns than did the major.

The Kuhns and their associates are heavily interested in water power and traction lines in the west and the visit here today of their business representative is of more than ordinary significance. When Major Reed was approached by a reporter for the Herald he positively denied that he was here on business of any kind.

"If you insist on mentioning my name in the Herald just say that I stopped over to see a few of my old acquaintances," said the major. "You see it is like this," he continued, "I have been to Portland and I got tired of riding in a Pullman and just stopped over in Baker to rest."

It is known, however, that there is something deeper behind his visit. There is a bitter fight on between the Kuhns and the Mainland interests for the control of the electric business in this section. The Mainlands recently acquired control of the Boise and Interurban Traction company which operates between Boise and Caldwell. The road is to be extended in the early spring to Welser.

It is well known that the company intends to continue the road down the Snake river to where Powder, river empties into the Snake and then down Powder river to Baker.

This is but a link of a main line which is to connect all of the interior towns between Boise and Walla Walla. At the latter point the line will be continued into Spokane, many miles of which is now in operation.

Major Reed denied any knowledge of this scheme but, frankly admitted that he probably would be in Baker again in a few days.
