EDUCATION AT ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 8.—St. Louis is preparing to entertain a large gathering of distinguished educators the last three days of this month, when the department of superintendence of the National Educational association will hold its annual meeting in this city. The local committee in charge of arrangements is in receipt of advice indicating that the meeting will be unusually well attended. More than a score of college presidents are expected together with many well known professors and superintendents of schools from all parts of the country.

At the coming meeting, for the first time in the history of the association, the several departments will meet jointly. The divisions are: National Council of Education; Department of Normal Schools; National Society of College Teachers' Education; National Committee on Agricultural Education and the Educational Press association.

Among the noted educators who will address the gathering are P. P. Claxton, United States commissioner of education; Superintendent Carroll G. Pearce of Milwaukee, president of the National Educational association; A. O. Thomas, president of the State Normal school, Kearney, Neb.; Homer H. Seerley, president of Iowa State Teachers' college, Cedar Falls, Ia.; David B. Johnson, president of Winthrop Normal and Industrial college, Rock Hill, S. C.; Prof. Bld T. Baldwin, of the University of Texas; Prof. V. A. C. Henmon, of the University of Wisconsin; Prof. William H. Heck of the University of Virginia; Prof. Elmer E. Jones, of the University of Indiana; Prof. George F. James, of the University of Minnesota; Prof. Chas. De Garmo, of Cornell university; Prof. Edward F. 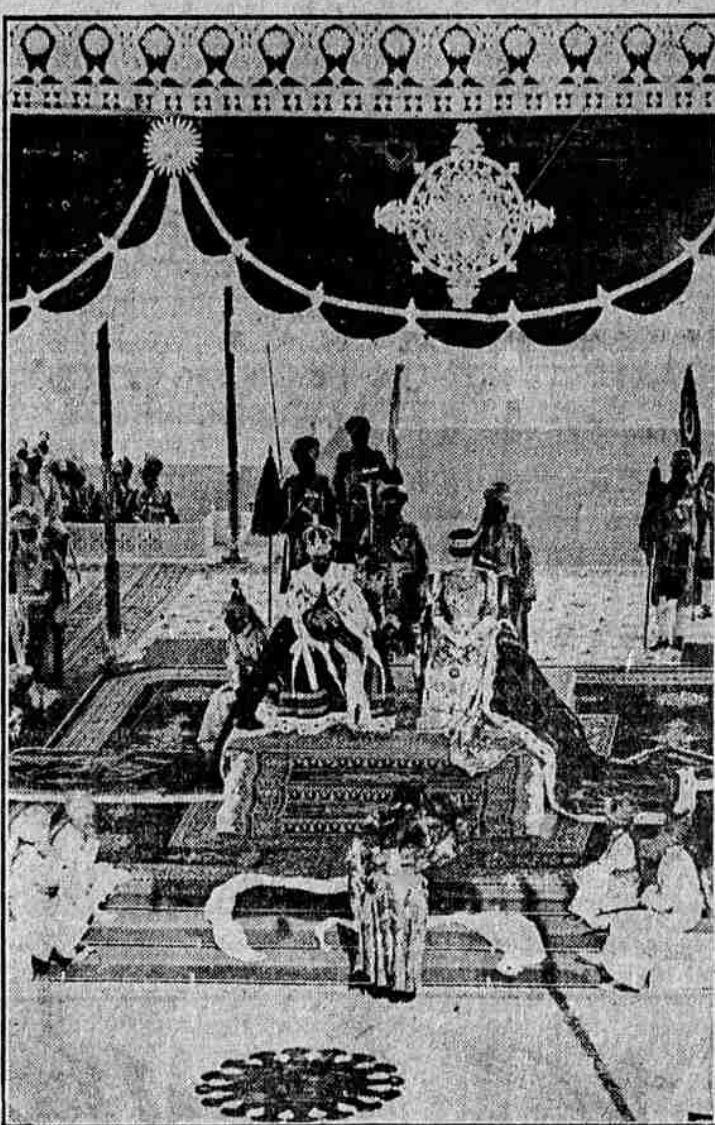

King George and Queen Mary Receive Homage at the Durbar



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ACCORDING to the correspondents who attended the durbar, the king and queen made no attempt to rival in splendor the vassals who gathered to do homage to their emperor. The king's own quarters were by his orders plainly appointed—so plainly, says one writer, "that no average English hostess would care for any honored guest to be in rooms or tents so solidly and unimaginatively furnished." Perhaps he made a virtue of necessity, knowing that the hoards of jewels belonging to the native princes and their genius for display would make fruitless competition by any occidental monarch, but it is more likely that his simple tastes dictated the policy which he seems to have followed throughout his Indian tour. Our illustration shows the king and queen on their thrones as they received the formal homage of the 700 rulers who gathered at Delhi for the ceremony.
