Those Injured in Fighting Fire Must Present Claims Quickly.

District Forester Geo. H. Cecil has just received information that March 31, 1912, has been set by the department of agriculture as the latest date on which claims under the general deficiency bill approved March 4, 1911 can be presented for casualties and disabilities suffered by temporary employees while fighting fire on the national forest prior to December 1, 1910.

Mr. Cecil believes that all claims originating in Oregon and Washington properly payable under this act have already been presented, but in case there are any still outstanding they may be submitted at once to the forest supervisor in charge of the forest where the accident occurred.
