ACCUSED PLEAD "NOT GUILTY"

CLARK AND DOTSON ARRAIGNED TODAY.

Circuit Court Still Hearing Evidence in Sheep Stealing Affair.

Ray Clark pleaded not guilty this morning to the charge of perjury for which he was indicted by the recent grand jury, the indictment accusing him of swearing falsely in connection with the issuance of a marriage license to W. R. Workman of Wallowa a few weeks ago. His case has not been set for trial.

Dotson Pleads Not Guilty.

Lon Dotson the Union man who was shot down by a South Union resident some few days ago when, as the assailant affirms, Dotson was attempting to burglarize the home, was arraigned today and pleaded not guilty. Dotson claims to know nothing of what transpired after he started home on the evening of the shooting, and denies that he was trying to effect an entrance into a house when shot.

BODIE'S JOKE ON WALSH.

Chicago American Outfielder Put One Over on His Famous Teammate.

Plug Bodie, the crack outfielder of the Chicago Americans, says that story about his being fooled into thinking he was to receive a green parrot in Washington for a home run was not told exactly along conservative lines. Plug admits that he was the receiving end of an intended joke, but declares that before he was through with the affair Ed Walsh was stung.

"It happened this way," says Bodie. "There was an old sign on the fence that for a home run a parrot would be given. One of the players who knew that the bonus had expired put up a job on me with the aid of the scorer, and I was given a note to the proprietor of the bird store. Milk and Cheese From Beans.

We were taught at school or on the farm that the three necessary steps in the production of butter and cheese were, first, the cow, second, the cow's milk and, third, the manufacture of butter and cheese and other dairy products from the cow's milk. Today the modest cow is being eliminated and a little soy bean is taking the cow's place. Milk is obtained from the beans by crushing them. From the bean milk, cheese and butter are being made; also condensed milk, milk flour and a form of casein which is said to contain essential elements of food. Before the soy beans are crushed they are soaked in cold water. Maceration results in the production of a thick milky liquid which can be filtered and drunk fresh or used for making butter and cheese just as in the case of cow's milk. Vegetable milk, butter and cheese are becoming popular in many parts of China, India and Japan where the cultivation of the soy bean is being encouraged. Beans cost less than cows.

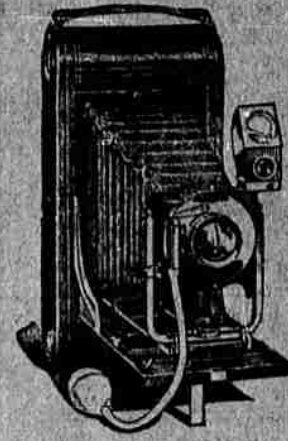
