NORTHWESTERN STILL INTACT

PORTLAND FRUIT EXCHANGE IS NOT TO BE SOLD.

Secretary of Central Exchange Here
Conferring With Growers.

As far as the state of Washington is

concerned, the Northwestern Fruit exchange which marketed many carloads of fruit for Grande Ronde valley growers and for all fruit districts throughout the northwest the past two years, is forgotten insofar as its purchase by the central exchange is concerned according to L. E. Meacham, secretary of the Central Fruit market exchange committee of 11. Mr. Meacham went to Joseph today and returns shortly to go on to his home in Walla Walla after visiting the Eastern Oregon district.

Some time ago, as per announcement in the Observer, it was believed possible that the Central Marketing exchange which was created two years ago and is now working itself into a tangible form, would take over the Northwestern company at Portland, but Mr. Meacham affirmed today that the state of Washington had dropped that plan, but admitted this may yet be done in a modified way by the Hood River and Rogue River districts.

Sherwood Williams, who is a member of the committee of 11 that is outlining the best methods of selling the fruit for all members of the exchange, has held a conference with Mr. Meacham and has been advised that La Grande is a member of the exchange and what profits are made to accrue to the growers of that association will be jointly and pro rata enjoyed by the La Grande growers.

"Unless the fruit growers get together and unify their selling plans there will be a disastrous crash to their interests," said Mr. Meacham today. "We will have to unite and stop flooding the markets in the east indiscriminately with carload lots or the disaster will come galloping over the hills and get us," he said.

causes and nominated men who will form a general arrangement committee for adapting the Men and Religion Forward movement to La Grande. All churches have not reported on this, but the following have been named: George H. Currey, general temporary chairman; from Episcopal church, J. D. Slater, J. H. Russell and J. D. Stout; from the Methodist, George H. Currey, W. H. Stanchfield and F. H. Green; from the Christian church, Mr. Colter, Mr. Campbell and Mr. Van Dusen. The others will report later.

Boys to Go.

While most of the men mentioned and several others from other denominations are going to attend the Walla Walla meeting and come home and put the movement into active use in this city, it is also a fact that many boys will go from this city to listen to the men of national fame in handling of boys and boy subjects. Several men are thinking of sending boys who cannot afford to go themselves.

The movement is one that is sweeping over the country from shore to shore and is leaving well organized centers everywhere. Men who otherwise have no connection with the church, and men who are enrolled but inactive, find among the five departments of this movement something that attracts and holds them to the church—such departments as boys or social work. All this was clearly pointed out during the morning services and at the afternoon mass meeting.

At the Methodist church yesterday morning Mr. Witham talked of the general plans of the campaign.

At the Episcopal church at the morning service, Bishop Paddock discussed the theme, at the Baptist church, the Christian and the Presbyterian other Walla Walla men discussed the theme preparatory to the afternoon meeting.

At the Presbyterian church Sunday morning Dr. S. B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman college preached an eloquent and inspiring sermon to a large and very appreciative congregation. His text was Matt. 16:9. God's provision for the world's need was abundant, but the distribution was inadequate. The men are not doing their part. They have slipped from the church for the reason, among others that the church has been too other worldly, and that her vision has not been great enough and has not proposed a plan or enterprise large enough to command the support of men. The Men and Religion Forward movement promises a remedy for this. It proposes something that is big, that is worth while, and that does command the interest and the support of men who are doing big things.

Prominent Publicist Here.
Among the men here from Walla

Walla who participated in the program was L. E. Meacham, vice chairman of the Walla Walla district, of M. & R. F. M., and until a year ago manager of the publicity department of the Commercial club at Walla Walla. Of late he is the promoter and publicist of the proposed fruit exchange for the entire northwest district.

President Penrose Here.

Another distinguished personage was President L. H. Penrose of Whitman college. The well known pedagogue is heart and soul behind the movement. Other visitors from the garden city were Scott Brainard, a student at Whitman college, and Fred W. Witham, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. Bishop Paddock was here from Pendleton also.

Scott Brainard gave a very interesting address on the Men and Religion Forward movement in the Island City church Sunday evening. He will remain over Monday to attend the Big Brotherhood banquet.

Geographical Puzzles.
