SHEEP STEALING CASE NEAR END

SWIKERT ON THE STAND IN HIS OWN DEFENSE.

Tells How Sheep Reached His Range North Powder Case Next.

Three days have now been consumed in the trial of Norman Swikert, an Elgin country sheep man who is accused of stealing sheep from a man named Johnson.

Swikert was on the stand today in his own defense and was put through a grilling cross examination. It being concluded at the noon hour. He makes no refutation of having had 17 sheep in his possession but claimed that they strayed to his ranges, and that he told several people of their presence there but found no trace of the owner. The following spring he bred them and clipped the flock along with his own, and went into negotiations to sell the clip but the deal fell through. He told of having put an identification mark on them, but not his own brand, saying he did so to be able to identify them later should the owner come after them and claim them.

The case will probably reach the jury this evening.

The next case up is one from North Powder, being a retrial with Lefebvre the plaintiff and Mr. Henry the defendant. It involves an account and has been heard before in circuit court.

SOMMER HOTEL BUILDING SOLD

N. K. WEST BUYS PROPERTY AS INVESTMENT.

George Stoddard, C. W. Nibley and Others Former Owners.

N. K. West has purchased the Sommer hotel building, covering a total of six blocks at the corner of Depot and Washington. The purchase price is \$30,000 and Mr. West buys the property merely as an investment.

The Sommer building was owned by the Oregon Land company in which George Stoddard, C. W. Nibley and others were the principal people.

Spokane Wants Miners.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 13.—(Special)—Spokane is an active contender for the 1912 convention of the American Mining congress, to meet the latter part of November or early in December, when the Alaskan land question is to be discussed by recognized experts. Philadelphia also has invited the congress to meet there. Spokane will have the united support of the entire western country. Robert E. Strahorn, vice president and general manager of the third division of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, is chairman of a committee of local business men appointed by R. Insinger, president of the Spokane chamber of commerce, to raise a fund by public subscription to pay the expense of a meeting in the northwest. Sidney Norman, formerly secretary of the Sierra Madre club of Los Angeles, who managed the congress there in 1910, says that more than 2,500 delegates from all parts of America, including a large representation from the territory of Alaska, would come to Spokane.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 13.—(Special)—Representatives of the American Trading company of New York, Shepard and Morse of Boston and Owen M. Bruner and company of Philadelphia, have placed orders in Spokane for 50,000,000 feet of special sawed white pine lumber, cut in eastern Washington and northern Idaho, for export to points in South America and South Africa. The local yard value of the lumber under contract is between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000. Some of the shipments will go by rail to will be sent abroad from ports on the Pacific coast.

Lumbermen operating in the district tributary to Spokane and in other parts of the Intermountain country are now negotiating with exporting

companies on the Atlantic coast to open new markets for white pine timber and lumber in Africa and England, and it is given out that the total exports from this part of the west this year will amount to more than 150,000,000 feet.

The Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railway company, which owns extensive pine areas in northern Idaho and operates large mills on the St. Joe river, has dispatched Albert L. Flawelling, its local representative and president of the Northwestern Forest and Conservation association, to South America to make a study of market requirements of the next 10 years.

Alebert W. Cooper of Spokane, secretary of the Western Pine Manufacturers' association, the members of which control 400 mills in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, says that the foreign market for northwestern white pine is being developed rapidly, adding there is also a growing market for yellow or western pine. He also said that the builders in Canada are using more Washington and Idaho lumber than ever before in the history of the industry.

Leo Gow, candidate for councilman in Georgetown, Colo., is said to be the foreign born Chinaman to run for office in America.
