Women as Assessors.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 13.—(Special)—Glen B. Creighton, assessor of Spokane county, has appointed seven women to handle household assessments in Spokane this spring. They will begin work early in March at \$90 a month, the same as is paid to men. Forty-two men have been appointed for this city. It is likely that a number of women will be named deputy assessors for the 18 incorporated towns in this county. This is the first time that women have been called upon to share in this work with men. Mr. Creighton says is appointees are married women of good business ability and he predicts they will do the work in a satisfactory way. "If they should do as well as we expect," he added, "I see no reason why they should not have equal chances with men in this kind of work." Mrs. D. B. Hirsch—the first woman appointed, probably will be chief deputy. The others are: Mrs. Lucille Van Ness, Mrs. L. M. Donaldson, Mrs. H. S. Golden, Mrs. Mary A. Welch, Mrs. Emma McClellan and Mrs. M. G. Plough.

COLLINS HELD IN BAKER JAIL

TWO JAP VICTIMS ARE NOT FATALLY HURT.

Baker Democrat Describes Details in Connection With Burglary.

Serious but not fatal injuries were inflicted by Howard Collins at Haines early Tuesday morning and for which Collins has been arrested, according to this morning's Baker Democrat. The Democrat today says in relating the incident given in considerable detail by the Observer yesterday:

Sheriff Rand returned to Baker last evening with Richard, or Howard Collins the principal in the Haines shooting yesterday morning, who was arrested yesterday noon by the marshal at North Powder, and the young man is now safely lodged in the county jail. His victims, M. Yoshida, proprietor of a restaurant at Haines, and Frank Mizo, his cook, are in the hospital here, neither in a dangerous condition although each was wounded in three places.

Collins, who was formerly employed by the Jap, entered the restaurant early yesterday morning. The proprietor and cook were asleep in the back room but were awakened and saw Collins going through the till which contained only \$2.00.

Yoshida spoke to Collins and told him to keep the money and go away without making a disturbance, but the latter pulled out a .32 calibre six-shooter and emptied three shots into each one of the Japs. Mizo received one bullet in the jaw, another in the body and a third in the arm. Yoshida suffered a clipped ear and finger and the third shot grazed his side.

The sheriff's office in Baker was immediately notified and Sheriff Rand reached Haines early in the morning, while word was sent to all nearby places with a description of the fugitive and he was picked up at North Powder in the forenoon. His weapon was an old style pistol and not very effective, but had his aim been truer he would certainly have bagged a pair of Japs, whereas, their injuries, especially those of Yoshida, are not even serious. Collins has been around Haines for some time and since he was discharged by the Jap he tried to kill has been employed at the Radium Springs sanatorium.

NEW TREATY DISCUSSED.

Arrangements for Replacing Abrogated One Are Going on Now.
Washington, Feb. 14.—The United

States is making preliminary negotiations with Russia to replace the 1832 treaty with a new instrument. The old one, abrogated recently, will expire Dec. 31, 1912. It is expected the chief difficulty will be over the Jewish passport question.

BOOMERS ARE ANGERED.

Roosevelt and His Groomers Have Trouble Over Speech.

New York, Feb. 14.—A serious split between Roosevelt and the progressive leaders who are grooming him to oppose Taft, is impending, according to reports from the Outlook office. As the result of Roosevelt's disinclination to adopt the radical progressive stand in his address to the Ohio constitutional convention at Columbus Wednesday, it is reported a hitch resulted over the endorsement of the trust's pleas for less business hysteresis which Roosevelt threatened to incorporate in his speech. Progressive told him this would eliminate the western progressives and cost him the nomination. A conference is on this afternoon trying to eliminate this phase of the speech.

BOURNE OPPOSES REDUCTION.

Oregon's Senator to Fight One-Cent Postage Rates.

Washington, Feb. 14.—The present effort to establish one-cent postage rates, is to meet with opposition by Senator Bourne of Oregon, chairman of the committee on postoffices and postroads, according to his authorized statement.

Contest for Next Friday Cancelled by Letter This Noon.

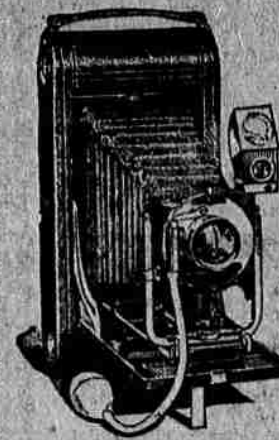
