B. W. HOOPER, NEWSBOY GOVERNOR OF TENNESSEE.

THE youngest governor Tennessee ever had has been breaking more records. Besides being the first Republican incumbent of the office since Judge Alvin Hawkins, elected in 1881, Benjamin W. Hooper can now lay claim to the distinction of being the only chief executive of the state who has spent a night in the penitentiary. He did so to gain a better idea of the reforms which he hopes to carry out in penal institutions. Among these are the establishment of indeterminate sentences and the parole system and the abolition of stripes in the case of well behaved prisoners. Governor Hooper is another of the men of high position who started in life as newsboys.

CAMORRAS ARE SAFE.

Believed That Final Announcement Will Soon Be Made of Failure.

Viterbo, Italy, Feb. 15.—An ultimatum, announcing the failure of the Italian government to convict Enrico Alfano and 19 other members of the Camorra gang on trial here, is forecasted today through the discharge of 22 of the 42 accused conspirators in the Cucco murder. Unimportant witnesses were on the stand today.

FOUR MUST DIE.

Murder of Chicago Truck Gardener Will Be Avenged Tomorrow.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 15.—Commutation of sentence denied them, four men must hang tomorrow for the murder of Fred Cuezor, who was killed at Chicago last September. The prisoners are: E. Wald, Frank Shiblaski, Phillip Somerling, and Thomas Schultz. They set up the truck gardener, beat him and shot him dead.

NEGRO IS LYNCHED.

Girl Identifies Negro Who Assaulted Her—Wants His Death.

Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 15.—An unnamed negro assailant of Date, aged 15, was lynched by a mob at Raleigh, Tenn., today. He was from a bridge and the body was riddled. The girl identified him and said she wished him lynched.

Bank Messenger Robbed.

New York, Feb. 15.—Two bank messengers employed by the East River National bank, were beaten and robbed of \$20,000 today while en route to the bank. The thugs escaped but it is believed an organized gang had laid their plans previously.

The Out of Date Doubloon.

Should the reader find a pirate's buried treasure he will have to dispose of his Spanish gold at its halloon value, for since Aug. 1, 1908, when the common crier made proclamation from the steps of the Royal Exchange of London that after that date the doubloon would cease to be legal tender in the West Indies, including British Guiana, the doubloon has not been the precious thing it was. In 1730 and for about a century after it was worth \$8, "more or less." It has ceased to be coined in its native country, Spain, and since 1908 it has been unpopular in the West Indies, where for a long time it figured in a mixed circulation embracing British, United States and Spanish coins. In the interest of romance, however, the name at least must survive. It signifies nothing more than that the coin was double the value of a pistole, but the doubloon was never such a mouth filling mockery as "pieces of eight," which suggest great riches, but mean only Spanish silver dollars, pieces equivalent to 8 reals.

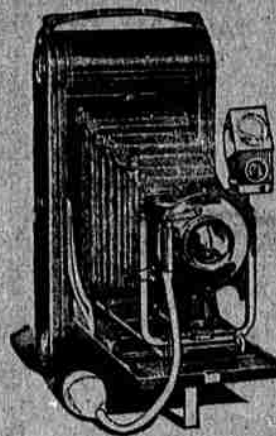
England's Great Wall.

Directly across the north of England, between points near Carlisle and Newcastle, ran Hadrian's wall, the northern boundary of the Roman empire. It is generally supposed to have been erected by the Emperor Hadrian between 117 and 138 A. D. The wall was of stone and was eight feet thick and twelve feet high. It was guarded by eighteen military stations, garrisoned by cohorts of Roman soldiers, and at intervals of a mile were forts built to contain eighty men each. Between every two forts were four watch-towers. South of the stone wall was a series of earthen ramparts, and between the two ran the great military road, still in use as a highway. Of this vast work comparatively few portions remain, a matter of wonder, perhaps, when one sees the solidity of the sections of the wall which still stand, but easily explained by the fine stone walls in the immediate vicinity.—Travel.
