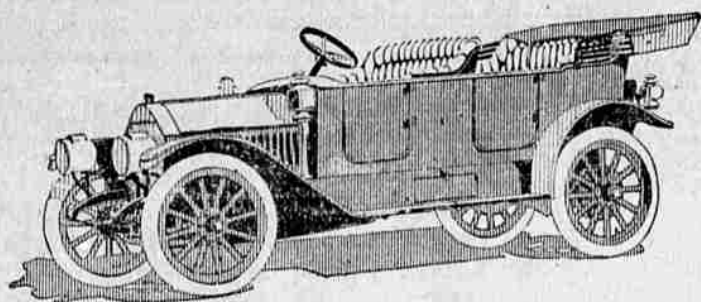

## ORGANIZING MORE CONTESTS

### C. C. THOMASON ENTERS FIELD FOR O. A. C.

Former La Grande News Writer Takes Up Big Field Task.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 16.—(Special)—C. C. Thomason, traveling extension organizer for the Oregon Agricultural college, went from the college Tuesday to Toledo and Newport, where he is to give addresses at the schools, and to the parents and teachers in the town halls, on the plans of the extension department for the organization of industrial contests among the children. He will explain the method of holding industrial fairs in which the children will exhibit their products, for which a great number of valuable prizes have been offered. The prize winners will take their exhibits to the state fair.

Mr. Thomason will next go south through Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties, spending the rest of the month in similar addresses there. He has already done much work in the same line in Tillamook, Washington and Marion counties. This work of improving rural conditions through the introduction of agricultural and other industrial work into the schools and encouraging the children to make gardens, raise pigs and chickens, and do other similarly practical work, is no experiment, since it has been tested in several states and

in a few counties in Oregon.

Mr. Thomason was formerly a reporter on the Observer news staff and also city editor of the Star for some time.

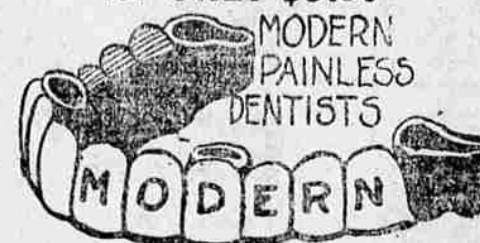
