The acme of perfection in every way, the formal affair stands out as introductory of auditorium decorations that have seldom been approached. Over 3,000 handmade red paper hearts were arranged in the most festive manner that ingenuity could devise. Long festoons of hearts of various dimensions suspended from the parent festoons, drooped and vibrated gracefully from center to wall in a dozen directions, and were caught to the ceiling over an enormous square dome which in turn covered the punch service in the center of the spacious floor. The dome was very artistically gotten up and was arranged in such a way as to give a smacking of crisp uniqueness to the general tone. Electroliers were shaded to a mellow degree by red paper and candelabras studded the punch service tables and wall space. Rest corners were provided, and each window was griddoned with strings of tiny hearts springing from a principal heart in the middle of the window space. The orchestra dais was prettily backgrounded with fir and hearts broke the monotony of the aperture leading to the orchestra space. In the ante room hearts and red electric light shades were also in evidence, and in the invitation and program the same general scheme was carried out admirably. The enormity of the amount of labor so artistically expended cannot well be appreciated until the aggregate showing is presented to view. All work was hand done, and adds lustre to the affairs of society propensities of the Millem girls who comprise the hostess list.
