

ASSASSIN'S AIM BAD HENCE KING EMMANUEL IS ALIVE

THREE BULLETS FIRED AT HIS MAJESTY MISS

QUEEN THROWS HER- SELF IN WAY OF ASSASSIN

MEMBER OF KING'S GUARD SHOT DOWN BUT KING LIVES

All Rome in Uproar Over Attempted Assassination of the King Today—Populace Enraptured With Bravery of the King and Queen When Anarchist Opens Fire.

Rome, March 14.—All Italy is rejoicing over the escape of King Emmanuel, whose life was attempted today by Antonio D'Alba, an admitted anarchist, who fired three shots at the king. One bullet struck Major Langa, one of the king's cavalry escorts and seriously wounded him. The assassin was arrested. The attempted assassination came shortly after the king had left the palace with the queen to attend memorial service in honor of his father who was assassinated. He was near the Pantheon where the memorial mass was being said, when D'Alba broke through the cheering crowds and opened fire. Afterward the king and queen sat coolly throughout the ceremonies at the Pantheon, but were in a closed carriage. The king owes his life to poor aim.

D'Alba stepped from the curb, approached the royal procession and drew a revolver and fired before the people realized what he was doing. Langa was struck by the second bullet and fell from his horse, being rushed to the hospital, while some guards closed about the king and others rushed and overpowered the man.

News of the attempt spread rapidly and thousands flocked to the Pantheon where the police had to use force to prevent the populace from taking off the horses and drawing the royal carriage themselves.

D'Alba was roughly handled by the police and narrowly escaped lynching. When the king returned he was accorded the greatest ovation received since he became ruler.

Queen Shields the King.

The assassin fired the shot from the side on which the queen was seated. She saw him level the gun and threw herself between him and the king, thus shielding the king's body with her own.

Meeting of Minnesota Teachers.

Rochester, Minn., March 14.—Every arriving train today brought delegates and visitors to the annual convention of the Southeastern Minnesota Educational Association. The convention has its formal opening tonight and the sessions will continue over tomorrow and Saturday. Among the noted educators on the program are President Vincent of the University of Minnesota, President Maxwell of the Winona Normal school, Professor M. V. O'Shea of the University of Wisconsin, and Dr. Nathaniel Butler, dean of the department of education of the University of Chicago.

Mortgage Foreclosure Case.

The foreclosure case of Gilbert Hunter company of Walla Walla vs. J. F. Hall of Elgin was before Judge Knowles today. The plaintiff is seeking to foreclose a mortgage on a threshing machine separator for which the defendant contracted with the Walla Walla company.

OREGON FIRST CROWD BUSY

STRAW VOTE SHOWS SELLING FAR IN LEAD.

Politics and Social Affairs Blend in With First Aim of Special.

San Francisco, March 14.—Warmly welcomed by officials and citizens the "Oregon first" delegation, nearly 200 strong, is today the guest of San Francisco. They are here to select a site for the Oregon building at the fair. This afternoon the Oregonians went in an auto procession through the town. Tonight they attend a reception at the Palace hotel. Many luncheons, receptions and other entertainments are scheduled for the remainder of the week.

During the journey from Portland to San Francisco the Oregonians kept in touch with the outside world through a newspaper of their own making. A straw vote taken on the train showed that 102 favored Taft, 44 for Roosevelt, 50 for La Follette, 10 for Clark, 10 for Wilson and eight for Harmon; for United States senator 35 favored Bourne, 22 Lane and 101 were for Selling.

Governor West, heading the Oregon delegation to select a building site at the fair said: "There is no question but that Wilson is overwhelmingly Oregon's democratic presidential choice and that the republicans are badly split up as a result of Roosevelt's entrance into the race."

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BEAVER CREEK MAY BE REFUGE

EFFORT TO GET ELK ON WATER SHED MADE.

Citizens and Elk Can Readily Procure Proclamation Is Belief.

La Grande and La Grande Elks will be given an opportunity to assist State Game Warden W. L. Finley to obtain a proclamation from the president or to procure special legislation, as will be deemed necessary, to make a preserve and a refuge pasture of Beaver Creek water sheds on which elk can there be planted to fuse new blood into the land already having habitate in that region and help swell the number of wild elk in this section of Oregon. Mr. Finley today intimated that such action is feasible and that about all that will be required to obtain such a proclamation or affairs will be signified willingness to help obtain it. The band now running in the Blue mountains is interbreeding and the quality and hardiness is gradually deteriorating until it is but a matter of a few years until the stock will have run out. A few wild elk planted in the territory would have a tendency of combining and unifying elk already there with those planted, and the outcome would be a prolific growth of strong antlered monarchs of the forest. The movement was set in motion last evening and was given hearty support from the start.

MANCHU POWER OVER CHINESE AGAIN FEARED

GLOOMY ASPECT OF CHINESE AFFAIRS WORRIES ALL

ARMY MARCHING AGAINST PEKING'S WEAK DEFENSE

Republic Newly Born Stands in Dire Danger of Again Falling Into Hands of the Manchu Princes Who Were Reluctant to Allow Abdication of the Emperor Last Month.

Peking, March 14.—The life of the Chinese republic is seriously menaced today by a determined movement looking toward restoration of the Manchu to power. The position of President Yuan is admittedly grave. Foreign residents at Peking are frightened over the approach of an army from Kansu and Shensi, commanded by General Sheng Yun. The younger Manchu princes, who strenuously opposed abdication, are back the general. Practically the entire third division of the republican army has left here today to intercept the rebel force. Owing to unrest and dissatisfaction among the republican troops. It is not believed that Yuan can hold out long against them.

Honor Memory of Senator Frye.

Washington, D. C., March 14.—Exercises commemorative of the life, character and public works of the late Senator William P. Frye of Maine were held in the senate chamber this afternoon. Eulogies were pronounced by all the members of the Maine delegation in congress and by Senators Lodge of Massachusetts, Bailey of Texas, Cullom of Illinois, Callinger of New Hampshire, Stone of Missouri, Simmons of North Carolina, and a number of other friends and admirers of Senator Frye.

5TH BLIZZARD IN ONE MONTH VISITS DENVER

ALL TRAINS DELAYED MANY HOURS IN KANSAS

WORST STORM IN MANY YEARS SAY REPORTS FROM DENVER

Fifth Storm in a Few Days Has Gripped Colorado and Kansas and Many Passenger Trains Have Been Stalled for Several Days—One Line to Chicago Is Sole Escape.

Denver, March 14.—The fifth blizzard this month is sweeping Colorado and Kansas today and has practically paralyzed railroad traffic. Three inches of snow have fallen here. It is one of the worst in years and all lines are in a bad way.

Union Pacific and Kansas City trains due here Sunday have not arrived, and the Rock Island is blocked to the east, and the Burlington is in difficulties.

Only the Union Pacific line to Chicago is open. Throughout the two states a score of passenger trains are stalled and the hardest efforts are being made to clear the rails.

JUDGE, SHERIFF AND STATE ATTORNEY SHOT BY FEUDIST

PACKERS REST TRUST TRIALS

DEFEND ON ARGUMENTS TO FREE BARONS.

Armour and Others Will Not Testify, Hence Case Rests.

Chicago, March 14.—Attorney Miller for the packers on trial here for criminal conspiracy announced that the packers would rest their case without submitting evidence, depending on arguments alone to save them from going to jail. Judge Carpenter immediately ordered a recess until Monday when argument will begin. This decision of the packers came after an early session in the ante room of the court between attorneys for the packers.

It is believed that the real reason why no defense is offered by the packers was the refusal of Armour and others to take the stand personally and submit to cross examination.

The judge indicated that the arguments will not be limited and they will probably consume most of the next week.

PRISON WARDEN KILLED.

Lincoln Institution Has Bloody Riot Following Long Grievance.

Lincoln, March 14.—At a mutiny at the state penitentiary this afternoon Warden Delahanty and three guards were killed. The outbreak has been brewing for some time. A week ago Albert Prince, a negro lifer, stabbed Deputy Warden Davis to death in the chapel during the service, and today's outbreak was the culmination.

VIRGINIANS RIOT IN COURT HOUSE FATALLY

CONVICTION OF FEUD LEADERS IS SIGNAL FOR SLAUGHTER

SHERIFF UNPREPARED AND SLAUGHTER IS TERRIFIC

One of Jurors, Though Heavily Armed Is Also Slain by the Riot's Bullets That Sling Through Court Room—First Three Shot Dead in Their Tracks by Angered Feudists.

Richmond, Va., March 14.—Presiding Judge Massey, Sheriff Webb and District Attorney Foster were killed today in a riot in the court room in Hillsville, Carroll county. The shooting affray followed the conviction of Lloyd Allen on a felony charge. Trouble was expected but the sheriff was unprepared. Relatives of Allen, it is said, had been carrying on matters with a high hand.

The firing started when the jury read the verdict.

Attorney Foster was the first killed. He was shot as he stood up to move for immediate sentence.

Troops have been rushed from here to stop the trouble, which continued throughout the day.

As the sheriff drew a revolver to defend order he got a bullet through the heart. The next shot killed the judge. Members of the jury were all heavily armed and several deputies then began firing into the Allen crowd. Several were probably fatally wounded.

Juror E. F. Webb, and one of Allen's brothers were also killed in a general revolver duel which followed.

Court Clerk Dexter Goad and three spectators were wounded by stray bullets which sang throughout the court room after the melee got under way. The riot was bloody and the court room was a gory scene before the worst was over. Bodies lay prone in the tracks where they fell for some time as the song of the bullets was too keen to permit anyone getting away from improvised cover. The shooting continued intermittently for some time.

Prisoner Started Riot.

Allen himself started the shooting with a gun smuggled to him and then his friends joined in the affray. Allen killed the judge. One was probably fatally injured.

Country Life Conference.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 14.—The first country life conference to be held in Pennsylvania assembled for a three day session in this city today, with a number of educators, agriculturists and railroad officials and others in attendance. The conference meets under the auspices of the Pennsylvania Rural Progress association, which was formed recently to exploit country life and to improve its conditions.

SPLENDID HERD OF WILD ELK VIEWED BY THOUSANDS

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Tamed and "civilized" by constant touch with man since early last week, 15 head of the erstwhile wild elk captured in Jackson's Hole arrived in La Grande last evening at 10 o'clock held in captivity in a box car which was a part of No. 55, a regular freight. Before the car had been switched onto the Joseph train and pulled out of town at 10 o'clock this morning, it is estimated that 3,000 men, women and children had climbed into the box car and viewed the splendid herd. All through the night, an attendant was kept busy assisting men in and out of the car, and with the coming of daylight, a steady stream of people jammed the passageway, and when the train departed, hundreds were crowding about anxious to get a view of the herd that is to be the parent band of what is hoped to be a prolific propagation.

ATTENDANTS ARE EXHAUSTED.

State Game Warden W. L. Finley, T. J. Craig, chief deputy and E. F. Averill, a Pendleton newspaper correspondent, made up the list of attendants and escorts to La Grande. They are completely exhausted by their long vigil. At every stop between St. Anthony where they received the elk until La Grande was reached, great crowds congregated. At Baker last night several thousand saw the elk. At Huntington the schools closed for the occasion. From the moment of their arrival here until the departure it was a steady stream climbing up to windows and doors.

HARD TRIP IS BEFORE THEM.

Though the elk are docile and content and chew their cud serenely enough, the hard portion of their journey remains. The 40 miles from Jo-

seph to the Chesniminus range will be covered by sledge if possible and a large number of Wallowa county people are interesting themselves in the work. J. H. Pearce and J. C. Gulling went out today to assist in the escort to Joseph.

Bulls Are Fine Fellows.

"Roosevelt" and "Taft" are the names that the attendants have applied to the two largest bulls, the largest by the way that have ever been shipped out of Jackson Hole. While "Roosevelt" is a docile animal now—in sharp contrast to his ferocious nature when placed in captivity a few days ago—he and "Taft" have yet to fight a mortal combat to determine the mastery of the band. This will occur when they get on the range. "Roosevelt" was extremely mean and ferocious at St. Anthony, chewing up a tin pan on one occasion, but he and his rival stood guard over the calves like a fond parent. He freely allowed men and children to pet his shaggy neck. Antlers had been shorn to facilitate transportation. "Roosevelt," the larger of the two, is three years and "Taft" two years old. In addition to the two big bulls, there are seven cows, mostly two year olds, although there are two that have reached the age of four. There are four heifer calves and two bull calves. The calves are transported the more easily and henceforth it is probable that the younger elk will be transported solely.

CARAVAN AWAITS ELK AT JOSEPH

HARD JOURNEY TO CHESNIMINUS LIES BEFORE.

Sixteen Wagons Needed to Transport Band to Future Pasture.

Joseph, March 14.—(Special)—At least 16 wagons will be used to haul the elk to the pasture. James Rodgers and F. I. Vergere will run the cook wagon. Mr. Vergere will also take photographs of the caravan and of the elk as they are unloaded.

Those who will actually haul the game from Joseph are they will be unloaded probably will be Hugh L. Arthur Haggerty, J. H. Beauman and J. R. McCoy of Enterprise, and Joe Sheets, John Blevans, Frank Marr, Tom Monroe, Ross Leslie, Albert Kenney and Carl Rapp of Joseph. Preliminary arrangements with these men have been made by Mr. Leffel, Deputy Game Warden G. W. Mitchell who had hoped and planned to make the trip and to assist in the preparations, has been confined to his bed for two weeks with pneumonia. He is recovering, but is far from being able to be out.
