Folke E. Brandt, His Counsel And M. L. Schiff's Attorney

FEW criminal cases not involving a capital crime have in recent years attracted so much attention as that of Folke E. Brandt, the Swedish manservant of Mortimer L. Schiff. The young man, who a few weeks ago was serving a thirty year sentence for burglary in the first degree, having pleaded guilty to the charge of breaking into the house of the New York banker, his former employer, no longer has the legal status of a convict, but is merely in the position of a man brought into court to answer an indictment charging him with the commission of a felony. This change in his standing was brought about by Justice Gerard's decision granting the writ of habeas corpus asked for by Brandt's attorney, Mirabeau L. Towns. A full investigation of the circumstances of Brandt's offense now seems to be assured, as the New York district attorney seeks to learn if there was a conspiracy by which Brandt was "railroaded" to prison after he had been induced to plead guilty by promise of a light sentence. Mr. Schiff and Howard S. Gans, who was his attorney during the early stages of the famous case, say they will welcome the fullest inquiry into the matter.

REFERENDUM FRAUDS ARE AIRED

Salem, Ore., March 14.—Arguments were heard today before the state supreme court in the University of Oregon referendum case—a case which involves alleged frauds under the referendum phase of the "Oregon system." Before the law appropriating \$503,000 for buildings and extensions of the University of Oregon at Eugene went into effect, petitions asking a referendum on the bills were filed with the secretary of state. Examination of the petitions by friends of the university is said to have disclosed frauds and irregularities to justify a suit to enjoin the secretary of state from putting the question on the ballot for next November.

Evidence introduced in the trial of the injunction suit in the circuit court indicated that the greater part of the 13,000 names on the petitions were secured by paid circulators at a few cents per name, and that in the case of even circulators gross frauds were charged.

Two lists of names were secured, it is alleged, by hanging the petitions in a saloon in Astoria, and another list of 100 names from The Dalles is said to have contained the names of men dead for years. Evidence was so conclusive that the defenders of the petitions had to admit that 3778 names were fraudulent, being forged, and in addition some 4525 names were presented in a form declared void by a previous decision of the state supreme court.

Elimination of these names brought the number of unattached names below the limit required to call a referendum. The secretary of state, however, contends through counsel that a part of the 4525 names should be considered good—enough of these being claimed to insure the referendum.

The university won its case in the circuit court, the judge scoring the good many of the signatures. In the fraudulent means used in securing a brief filed on appeal, the university contends that even the names unattached by direct evidence should be

looked upon with suspicion because of frauds admitted on the remainder of the petition.

The final decision on the case is the friends and opponents of the Oregon system of popular government.

Among the notable outsiders who have manifested an interest in the proceedings are Governor Harmon of Ohio, Governor Wilson of New Jersey, and the Rt. Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador at Washington and author of "The American Commonwealth." From each of the three men named have come requests for copies of the briefs filed in the case.

Arm Shipments Opposed.

Mexico City, March 14.—Officials of President Madero's cabinet today announced that a strong effort to crush the shipment of arms into Mexico has been prohibited by the United States.

El Paso, March 14.—Official admission that President Madero plans to retake Juarez from the Vasquez rebels came today when the Mexican consul, Senor Llorente, took 500 rifles, a half million rounds of ammunition ordered for the federal troops. The arms were immediately sent across the line to Ojinaga where Colonel Sajan is encamped with a large federal force.
