Baron Gibson-Carmichael.

Baron Gibson-Carmichael, who recently was elevated to the peerage, was born in Edinburgh, March 18, 1859, and received his education at Cambridge university. He began his career as private secretary to Sir George Trevelyan and Lord Dalhousie, when secretaries for Scotland. Since then he has filled such opposite positions as chairman of the Scottish board of lunacy and trustee of the national gallery, and he is grand master of the Scottish Freemasons. He filled several public positions in England, and succeeded the late Mr. Gladstone as member of parliament for Midlothian in 1895. He has been governor of Madras for the past year, taking that post after the governorship of Victoria, Australia. His baronetcy dates back to the days of Charles I.

A German Election Story.

According to a Paris contemporary, Dr. Schifferer, a National Liberal candidate for the Reichstag, in the course of his recent campaign overtook in his motorcar a herd of bullocks. America and the Nobel Prize.

The Nobel roll of honor affords a unique opportunity to see which nations are doing the most for civilization as indicated by the sixty-five inventors who since 1895 have received this award. Germany has been so honored sixteen times and stands at the head in all five departments of achievement. France stands second with ten Nobel prizes, followed by England with seven and Holland with five. Then come Russia, Italy, Switzerland and Sweden with four each, and Denmark, Spain, Belgium, Austria and the United States with two each, and Norway with one.

It is humiliating to American pride to be put in the lowest rank with countries as small as Denmark or as backward as Spain. The justice of the awards we do not question. The trouble goes farther back than that. We have not achieved, and we have not deserved.
